As I stood waiting the other day in the hardware store for a bundle to be done up I fell to thinking of the clerk who had waited on me. He was, somewhat past middle age. He had on a black alpaca jacket, a grey tie, chosen most obviously for qualities of service rather than beauty, and a pepper and salt suit. His face was thin and lined. His mouth drooped at the corners. His hair was grey. His manner was nervous. He had a dispirited, tired look. I had noticed that expression several times before when I had been in the store, but for some reason it struck me more sharply to-day.

"Poor thing," I thought to myself. "I suppose he has been through this monotonous grind wrapping up nails and screws and selling garden tools and kitchen ware day after day for years. No wonder he feels dispirited. What a life!"

Plump and Placid.
 And then as I was oozing pity and sympathy at every pore and looking about the shop as about a prison house that had made this poor man into such a nervous, unhappy, dispirited creature, I noticed another clerk, and the thought suddenly came over me "why he must be just as old as the other man but how differently he looks."
 The man was plump and placid

looking. There were wrinkles in his face, but they were pleasant ones. He smiled when he asked his customers if there was anything more he could do for them. He did up bundles carefully and competently but without any trace of the nervousness the other man showed. He did not wear an alpaca coat and his grey suit had a certain jauntyness about it.

It Hasn't Left the Same Mark.
 Now I know that both these men have been working in this shop for many years. They are familiar figures to me though I do not know their names. They have had, presumably, very much the same monotonous grind to live through. And what different marks it has left on the two of them!

No Cruelty!

All Rodeo Summonses Dismissed—Majority Decision Cheered in Court.

loud applause in court greeted the decision of the Hon. magistrates to dismiss all the Rodeo summonses. Mr. Charles B. Cochran, the promoter of the contest at the Wembley Stadium, and Mr. Tex Austin, the director and manager, were summoned for unlawfully having kept a place "for the purpose of fighting certain animals, to wit steers," and "with having unlawfully caused to be cruelly ill-treated certain animals on June 14, 18 and 19." In addition five cowboys—James Richard Hantoon, Charles Irwin, Guy Schalk, Powder River Thompson, and Add Biddings—were summoned for cruelty on various dates. A timekeeper, E. H. Johnson, was summoned for aiding and abetting on June 18 and 19. Mr. Tex Austin was the chief witness. He strongly denied there had been any cruelty at Wembley. He told the court that he had taken part in many roping contests, and had been prosecuted on before. "That," he added, "was by a bunch of people in my own country similar to these people here, and all the summonses were dismissed." So far as the Rodeo at Wembley was concerned, he was invited to produce it by Mr. Cochran. He understood that it was with the approval of the Government. A lot of literature was sent to him giving the Prince of Wales as President of the British Empire Exhibition, and he thought it would be with the approval of the Prince. "Accidents are inevitable in a contest of this kind," he explained, "the same as in the Grand National." He mentioned that the cowboys paid their own expenses except the bare cost of transportation. Witness had nothing to do with the admission to the Rodeo. In point of fact he paid \$56 for seats for himself and friends at the first performance—Sir Henry Curtis Bennett, cross-examining: Would you be properly described as "Rodeo King"?—I do not know. "You are a citizen of the United States?—Yes, we have no kings there—I understand your description of people in America like the R.S.P.C.A. is "a bunch of people who live by donations and misrepresentations." The same as yours here. The Rodeo had not been a money-making performance so far as witness was concerned.

 but had spent more than that. The Rodeo party numbered 140, and of these 130 were Americans—Sir Henry: Was the animal that broke

its leg suffering?—No.—Quite happy with its broken leg?—I never asked him.—There was a scene when the Court resumed after a short adjournment. One of the few amongst the considerable number of women in the court rose and addressed the magistrates. "I wish to make a protest!" she shouted.—"During the war 200,000 wives, babies, and infants were slaughtered and the R.S.P.C.A. did nothing, and our magistrates throughout were idle."—The interruptor was forcibly removed.—Sir Edward Marshall-Hall, addressing the magistrates on behalf of Mr. Cochran, stated: "I is unfortunate that this originated as it has. It has given rise to a great deal of fanatical feeling. I deeply resent the suggestion that because I am appearing for Mr. Cochran have no sympathy with animals.—At the adjournment a woman dressed as a lady called me a dirty traitor, and mentioned that she had heard me speaking on the platform of the Dumb Friend's League. I have done so, and hope to do so again, but I regret very much the fanatical feeling which is broadcast condemning anybody before they have a chance. I am a lover of animals, but I like to see fair play.—The magistrates refused for more than half an hour to consider their decision. When they returned the chairman stated that the case had attracted a great deal of public interest, and much had been written on both sides, not only in this country but in many others. A great deal of it was absolutely irrelevant to the point of view which concerned the Court. As in cases of ordinary common cruelty all they had to do as justices was to consider whether the evidence they had listened to during three hearings convinced them that certain specific acts of cruelty had been committed. They must be acts of cruelty according to the laws of this country and not of any other country. The magistrates were not concerned with the state of public

opinion either in this country or in others. They all knew that opinion was very much divided, and there was considerable division of opinion on the Bench. They had reached their result by a majority of six magistrates to five. That decision, was that all the summonses must be dismissed.—The cowboys with loud whoops darted out of the court, and in the corridor threw their wide-brimmed hats into a circle and danced around them until policemen cleared them of the premises. As they left the court there was a great demonstration, well-dressed women crowded round them and shaking hands.—Mr. Roland Oliver, for the R.S.P.C.A. announced that he would have to take advice as to whether other summonses relating to other days at the Rodeo would be proceeded with.
