The Guelph and North-western Railway.

(From the Hamilton Times.)

Every inhabitant of Hamilton who ha e welfsre of the city at heart, will thank the Council for the prompt ac last night in the matter of the Guelph and North-western Railway, as elsewhere and North-western Rallway, as elsewhere mentioned. As is well known, it was de-clided some two years ago to offer for sale a certain number of shares of Great Wes, tern Rallway stock, held by the city, amounting to somewhere about one hundred thousand dollars. No sale, however, has yet been effected, and the stock is still in the hands of the London agents. The proposition now made is that this should be exchanged for stock of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, which, when done, will at once render certain the building of the first thirteen or fourteen miles, from Guelph to the Grand River-the only section on which the local bonuses fall short of the amount required. Compared with the benefit which the new railway will be to Hamilton, the dividend now received on the Great Western stock is but as a drop in the bucket, even were no dividend ever to be received from the stock which is to be taken in exchange. But happily there is no reason at all for contemplating that contingency, however strong the case would still be in favor of the proposed exchange. The important fact is to be remembered that the Great Western dividends are paid on the large capital cost of \$70,000 per mile, whereas the Guelph and North-western will have to pay dividends only on about \$10,000 or \$11,000 at the outside. For the \$5,000 per mile from the municipalities there being a bonus, draws no dividends after wards, the people being content to make it a free gift out and out, at once, for the sake of the benefit the railway will be to them. Offers are in hand from perfectly reliable parties to complete the road, including right of way, rails, and everything but the rolling stock—the latter not having to be provided by the Company, as the Great Western will run th road -within Mr. Reid's estimate of \$15,-500 per mile. Rules for the Management of Infants During the Summer Months to Prevent Summer Complaints.

Buring the Summer Months to Prevent Summer Complaints.

1.—Preserve cleanliness of room, clothes and person of child, and secure fresh air by open windows, resort to parks, ferries, &c.

2.—Use light fiannel covering of chest and bowels at all times, and other clothing to suit the changes of weather.

3.—Infants under one year should, if possible, have a wet nurse. Until six months old they may nurse not oftener than every two or three hours; over six months, five times in twenty-four hours.

4.—If the child do not nurse, it must still take milk, which should be prepared as follows: Boll a teaspoonful of barley (ground in a coffee mill or take prepared barley) with a gill of, water for, fifteen minutes, to which add a little ealt; to this add half the amount of boiled milk and a lump of loaf sugar; give it to the child lukewarm out of a nursing bottle. The bottle and mouthplece should be always kept in water when not in use.

5.—If the child is over six months old, the boiled milk and barley water should be in equal quantities, with sait and loaf-sugar. If the child is over six months old, the boiled milk and barley flour; if very costive, use oatmeal grain, strained before it is mixed with the milk.

6.—If the child is partly nursed, it should be fed sufficiently with food, prepared as above directed, the child being nursed and fed alternately.

7.—Beef tea or beef soup may be added to this food for infants of five months or older; when ten or twelve months of other may suck rare-done beefsteak.

8.—No child under two years of age should be allowed the miscellaneous diet of the table.

9.—On the first appearance of the symptoms of the Summer complaint, (vomiting and purging,) place the child under the care of a physician.
