EAST MISUNDERSTANDS WEST, SAYS VISITOR

James Little of Eastern Town-
ships is Agreeably Sur-
prised With Alberta

Amazed at the Size of Fields
and the Condition of
the Crops

"If the people of the east understood
the conditions existing in the western
provinces more thoroughly, there
would be a much better feeling, and
both sections would be benefited there-
by," said James Little, of Centerville,
Eastern Townships, yesterday, when
visiting Calgary, the guest of
J. S. Reilly.

"This is my first visit and I am
most agreeably surprised at conditions
here. I took a drive with Mr. Reilly
through the Parkland district, and
was amazed at the size of the fields
and the condition of the crops. They
are indeed a contrast to the ten, twenty,
and thirty acre farms we have at
home. The grain appeared to be well
matured, and if I am any judge of
crops, Alberta should have a most
productive season.

"This is the first time I have ever
left the east, and I have the
feeling in an acute form. And I am not
alone. Eastern farmers and business-
men are giving up the homes that they
took a generation to establish to an-
swer the call of the prairies."

TO INVESTIGATE TORONTO
POLICE

Toronto, July 18.—The News says:
According to information received
this morning there is every possibility
of an early investigation by the board
of police commissioners into the dis-
crepancies made at the recent Farmers'
bank inquiry in regard to the loose
man in which important documents
were handled by the detective de-
partment.

The machine is operated by an en-
gine imported from Switzerland. None
of the cities of the East, not even New
York, had introduced the new type of
sprinkler, and consequently the truck
was delayed in arriving in St. Louis
on account of the many demonstra-
tions.

Rump Convention

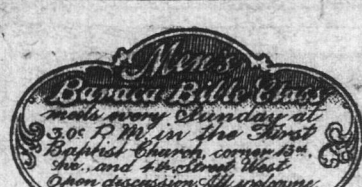
Winnipeg, July 19.—Accredited representatives from the
municipal councils, boards of trade and industrial bureaus of

nipeg, for the purpose of forming a co-operative organization.
After seven hours heated discussion the meeting adjourned with-
out electing officers and without formulating any definite
policy. Before the adjournment Mayor Waugh of Winnipeg,
was appointed provisional chairman and Chas. F. Roland, pro-
visional secretary, for the purpose of arranging for a session in
Regina, November 1, next.
