LOUIS PAULSEN.

The Creat Chess Player Who Has Died

Paul Morphy, probably the greatest chess player who ever lived, was an American, and while Paulsen was not a native of the States, he became famous there. Louis Paulsen was born June 14, 1833, in the principality of Lippe-Detmold, Germany. His father was a strong chess player. When 4 years old Louis watched hie father teaching the moves to his two elder brothers and his sister. Louis was intended to become a gentleman farmer, but in 1854 he emigrated with his brother Ernest to the States and established business in Dubuque, Iowa. He cultivated chess with such success that he received in 1857 an invitation from Chicago to take part in a tournament. Having beaten the strongest players in that city, he was persuaded to ment. Having beaten the strongest players in that city, he was persuaded to take part in the first American Chess Congress in New York in 1857. Paulsen wor the second prize, Morphy being first. Morphy was the only player who beat him. He lost against him five games, won one and drew two. In New York Paulsen first tried his skill as a blindfold player. Out of five games played simultaneously he won four and drew one. This achievment created such a sensation at that time that the New York Chess Club gave him a gold medal. Subsequently he played soven, then ten and finally fifteen games simultaneously. In 1860 he returned to Europe and challenged Morphy, who refused to play with him. He engaged in a number of contests, the most memorable one of which was with Kolisch. This match was drawn after Paulsen had This match was drawn after Paulsen had won seven, lost six; there were eighteen draws. In the London tournament of 1859. Paulsen won the second prize, but after wards beat the winner, Anderssen. Hillife almost up to the time of his death was a series of triumphs, and he was severa times first. In 1889 in Breslau he divided the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh prizes.
