The Advertiser has already published the details of their demand, and the reply of the Minister is not yet known. PERILS OF THE SEA.

Sinking of the Savonia-All Hands Saved.

Fatal Accident on Board the Sardinian -No News of the Erin.

London, Jan. 25.—The German steamer Savonia, which left New York Jan. 3 for Hamburg, was abandoned in a sinking condition Jan. 13. All hands were saved. The Savonia carried a cargo of \$60,000 worth of corn and \$100,000 weeth of cotton. The vessel was valued at \$150,000. The crew consisted of 30 men. The vessel was owned by R. M. Sloman & Co., Hamburg. She was of 1,553 net tonnage, and was 304 feet long.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 25.—The steamship Sardinian, just arrived here, had a terrible experience in the Atlantic storms. On experience in the Atlantic storms. Carriday of last week one of her funnels we smashed by a heavy sea, and Fourth Enneer Lillman and two firemen were burn neer Lillman and two firemen were burned to death and four others badly injured. The Sardinian lost four boats and the saloon was flooded; the fires were extinguished and the steamship was forced to lay to for 48 hours. The first and second officers, the quartermatter and second officers, the quartermaster and cook were also severely injured.

Experience of the Lydian Monarch.

Halifax, Jan. 25.—The Lydian Monarch, from London, bound to New York, put in here yesterday morning for coal. She experienced fearful weather, but sustained only trivial damage. She has a number of passengers, including twenty first-class. The mail steamer Oregon, which arrived this morning from Liverpool, reports: Left Liverpool on the 9th, encountering heavy gales all the way. A heavy sea struck the steamer shortly after leaving Moville, smashing the bridge. Captain Williams being on it at the time, he fell to the deck and sustained injuries the extent of which are not known at the present time. The fourth officer and several of the seamen were also injured by being thrown against the vessel's side. Heavy ice was encountered off the coast of Newfoundland, the steamer having to go back about 140 miles.

The steamer Caspian, which left Halifax on Monday last for St. Johns, Nfid., for Liverpool, Eng., was prevented from calling at the former port on account of ice. The passengers for St. Johns, were obliged to go to Liverpool and return to Halifax, as there are no steamers running between England and Newfoundland at this season of the year.
