—The city bakers will bake no bread tomorrow, having decided to hold their annual outing on the same day as the grocers.

—Edward Kelley was given one week in jail by Squire Lacey yesterday in default of a \$1 fine for damaging the baseball grounds fence.

—Mr. W. P. Abey, latterly messenger at the M. C. R. city agency here, has been appointed cashier of the T. H. and B. Railway at Brantford, and has entered upon his new duties.

—John Taylor was charged before Squire Lacey yesterday afternoon by Thos. Bradshaw, hotel-keeper, on charge of London township, with maliciously cutting the top of his buggy. The case was adjourned for a week.

—Thos. Ralph, charged with non-payment of wages by Clarke Fisher before Squire Lacey yesterday afternoon. The amount in dispute was 75 cents, but the costs of the court brought Ralph's bill up to \$3.

—The G. T. R. are making considerable improvements on the road in the vicinity of Galt. The bridge a mile and a half from the town is being replaced by a stone archway, as also are two bridges beyond Brantford. A large staff of men are at work.

—The Detroit News says: The Detroit railway has been sold to R. T. Wilson, Street Railway Company. This statement is official, coming from Mr. Henry A. Everett, vice-president and general manager of the Detroit railway.

—Bishop O'Connor, of this city, has received a letter from Fr. Wagner, of Windsor, in which the latter complains of being "very" disturbed by the prayers of the faithful of the diocese. The letter was dated from Alsace, whither Fr. Wagner had gone after visiting Rome.

Klaw & Erlanger, the celebrated New York theatrical agents, and London will get the best that is going. Mr. Whitely will be the lessee and Mr. A. E. Roote the local manager of the Grand as before.

He is now in charge of the Lehigh express, which runs between Niagara Falls and Port Huron. The change is a substantial promotion for Miller, who has been in the service of the G. T. R. for many years.

—St. Thomas Journal: The elevated railway at Port Stanley, belonging to the Ellison estate, has been sold, and it is understood will be operated by L. E. and D. R. R. Cutting 'Em Down.

Judges Bell and Doyle to Meet on July 27.

For the Purpose of Dividing the County Into Electoral Divisions.

County Clerk Robson has received notification that on July 27 Judge Bell, of Chatham, and Judge B. L. Doyle, of Goderich, would sit for the purpose of dividing the county of Middlesex into electoral divisions in accordance with the act passed by the Ontario Legislature at its last session, reducing the number of councilors. By this act, county councilors will be elected by the people instead of by the municipal councils. They will be elected on the same day as municipal councilors, but will be entirely a separate body. No municipal councilor is eligible to sit on the county board. There are at present in the County Council some 48 members, and by this act these have been reduced to about sixteen members. The basis upon which this division is made, sections 2 and 3, is chapter 52, of the R. S. O., as follows:

1. If the population of the county is 25,000 or less, it shall have not less than eight or more than ten members.

2. If the population is more than 25,000, but less than 40,000, not less than ten or more than twelve members.

3. If the population of the county is 40,000 or more, but less than 60,000, not less than twelve or more than fourteen members.

4. If the population is 60,000 or more, not less than sixteen nor more than eighteen members.

For the purpose of this act, each county shall be divided into districts or divisions which shall be known as "county council divisions" as
