THE CZAR'S PROCLAMATION. St. Petersburg, May 28.-The proclamation issued by the Czar on the occasion of his coronation prescribes various remissions, of which the following are the principal: All arrears of taxes in European Russia and Poland are remitted, and the land tax is reduced by half for ten years. The centences of exiles in Siberia are materially reduced, political offenders receiving further remissions, with the restoration of their civil rights in some cases. 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
