A Boer Commandant Offered to Make Terms—"Unconditional Surrender" the Answer-Contradictory Accounts Regarding the Relief of Mafeking-One States That the Entire Boer Force About the Town Was Captured-The Queen Expresses Her Gratification—Boisterous Jubilation Ends in Rioting - Buller and Rundle Continue Their Successful

Movements.

London, May 21-2:20 p.m.-The war office confirms the dispatch that Mafeking has been relieved.

BULLER HEARD FROM.

London, May 21-2 p.m.-The war office has received the following message from Lord Roberts: "Kroonstad, May 21.—Buller reports that his vance will be delayed for a few days on account of the way in which the railway has been destroyed."

LADYBRAND OCCUPIED BY

BRITISH "Rundle reports that Ladybrand has

been occupied. "Hunter is pushing up the railway with supplies for the Mafeking garrison, and is arranging a hospital train for the conveyance of the sick and wounded to Kimberley.

"Methuen has left Hoopstad to cooperate with this force."

KRUGER HAS NOT SUED FOR PEACE.

London, May 21-2:25 p.m.-There is no truth in the report that President Kruger has sued for peace, and no communication from him on the subject is expected in the immediate future.

THE QUEEN GRATIFIED.

London, May 20-4:15 a.m.-Last night's court circular contains the following: "The Queen received on Friday night with the greatest gratification and thankfulness the news of the relief of Mafeking after a heroic defense of over seven months by Col. Baden-Powell and troops under his command."

This is the first official intimation of the relief of Mafeking, and it would not have been made had any doubts existed in the official mind as to the correctness of the news.

A dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated Kroonstad, 3 p.m., today, says: "No official intimation has yet been received, but Reuter states that the relief of Mafeking has been effected."

DEWET OFFERS TO SURRENDER London, May 20. - A special dispatch from Kroonstadt says that General Dewet has sent word that he is prepared to surrender conditionally with

his entire commando.

London, May 21. — It now appears that the Dewet who offered to surrender with 1,000 men was not the well-known General Dewet, but Commandant Dewet. He stipulated that his men should be allowed to return to their farms. Lord Roberts replied that the surrender must be unconditional.

Want Peace.

WILL MAKE OVERTURES New York, May 20. - A dispatch

from Lorenzo Marquez, dated May 19, says: "The Transvaal Government decided to send a message today to Lord Roberts requesting a cessation of hostilities, demanding a guarantee that the lives of all colonials fighting with the Boers shall be spared, and stating that unless these terms are granted the mines will be blown up and Johannesburg destroyed. The government has been for some time considering the destruction of President Kruger and executive council were against the proposition, but strong popular pressure was brought to bear in favor of it. President Kruger has had a dream When Catherine Clark marries Dr. that the war would be ended within three weeks, which he firmly believes. There is much uncertainty in Pretoria, where Kruger is the only strong hand. The Boer president told me yesterday that he would fight until

All is being taken to Lydenburg, where the capital may be removed. Notwithstanding the dis-couraging situation, President Steyn maintains a cheery and bold meanor. A few hundred men of the foreign legion attacked Mafeking Saturday and carried several forts. The Boers failed to support them, and the result was a fiasco. The relieving column of British was then withing a few miles of the town, and—the Boer government has stopped all telegraphic news going out."

The Relief Column.

BOERS WITHDREW EAST. London, May 19 .- A special dispatch that a large British force from the south succeeded in entering Mafeking vesterday (Wednesday), and that the commandoes withdrawing eastward. Another Cape Town account of the

composition of the relief column says that it consisted of 2,000 men of the South African Light Horse, the Imperial Yeomanry and the Kimberley Horse. It left Kimberley on May 4, with 35 wagons, containing stores and ammunition, with four guns of the horse artillery and two maxims, and moved west along the railway without of the most striking episodes of the meeting opposition. At Kraaipan the Boers fell back when attacked The relief column, as it approached Mafeking from the south, was attacked by a strong force of Boers, who were repulsed. The rear guard continued in action for some time. The British casualties were slight.

BOERS BARRED THE WAY. Pretoria, May 19.-The Associated Press' special western border corre-spondent wires that the relief column entered Mafeking on Wednesday night. Gen. Delarey engaged them successfully during the whole of Wednesday, but during the night one of the officers withdrew without the general's knowl edge, thus leaving a way clear for the column to enter.

ANOTHER STORY. London, Monday, May 21 .- A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Sunday, says: "On Thursday the entire Boer force around Mafe king, including the guns, was captured by the British."

Volksrust, on the Transvaal border, May 17, via Lorenzo Marquez, May 18—5 p.m.—The large tunnel at Laing's Nek, which was 2,213 feet long, and which afforded the only means of rail-way communication between Natal and the Transvaal, has just been completely destroyed by the Boers, who blew it up with dynamite. A very large quantity of the explosive was used, and its effect was terrific. REJOICING TURNS TO RIOTING. The boisterous rejoicings over the news from Mafeking have become riots in parts of London, Aberdeen and Belfast, and elsewhere in the United Kingdom. In the Finchley district of suburban London a mob stoned a railway station master's house and smashed the windows of a draper's shop, setting the building on fire also, whether by accident of design it is not yet known. Two clerks were injured. The house of a Boer sympathizer at Harlsden was attacked by a large crowd, and the windows were shattered. The police charged the mob, and were greeted with a shower of decayed eggs. Numerous arrests were made, and the police reserves were called out. Rioting took place in Aberdeen from 7 to 10 o'clock Saturday evening around a hall where a "stop the war" meeting was being addressed by Mr. Cronwright Schreiner, husband of Olive Schreiner. A crowd of students and others

tried to storm the hall and to break down the doors. The foot police were

unable to cope with the disturbers, and sent for the mounted police, who
