

THE WILLIAMS MURDER.

Continuation of the Coroner's Inquest at Cooksville.

Cooksville, Jan. 5 .- There was very little new in yesterday's evidence. Some sixteen or eighteen witnesses were examined, but they simply confirmed the statements which have already been published. The chief points were the further identification of the prisoner MacWherrell, and incidentally of Walker also, the trac-Ing of the horse and cutter from the Armory Hotel on that Friday night until it was sold to Lowry, the Parliament street butcher, and the absolute establishing of the fact that Butcher and Walker were well acquainted before the horse deal on the Saturday following the murder and not strangers, as claimed by the former prisoner. It was also shown by the witness, Brown, and his sons that MacWherrell had originally announced his intention of staying with them until after Christmas, but that after reading the descriptions of himself in the Globe he suddenly left them without explaining his change of plans.

TORONTO, Jan. 5.- A rumor reached the city this afternoon that MacWherrell, in custody at Brampton on suspicion of being connected with the Williams tragedy at Port Credit, had committed suicide in prison by shooting himself with a revolver. Subsequently a dispatch was received from

Brampton as follows: There is no truth in the rumor that MacWherrell committed suicide this morn-

The inquest will be resumed at 12:30 Wednesday next, when the crown will offer more evidence.
