LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The Board of Trade meets to-morrow evening.

—The Orient Minstrels performed in Aylmer last night.

—Mrs. J. J. Hanratty, of Peterboro, is visiting with her sister, Mrs. Aust, 706 Dundas street.

—Neil Cooper yesterday sold the house and lot (755 Maitland street), property of G. C. Cooper, to Mr. Robbins, of the C. P. R., for \$1,275.

—Mr. James Smith, brother of Mrs. Harry Walsh, is here from San Francisco visiting his old home after an absence of twelve years.

—A peddler named Macdonald was arrested while begging lodgings on the market last night. The magistrate advised him to leave town to-day.

—To Mr. Thomas Hogg the credit is due of drilling the St. Albans Company, No. 100, Church Lane Bridge, that performed in the East End Hall on Tuesday night. The boys showed the result of his training in their military-like movements.

—Mrs. Mary Stone, relict of the late Richard Stone and an old resident of the city, passed quietly away yesterday at the residence of her son Richard, 666 Queen's avenue. Three sons—Richard, Fred and William—and one daughter—Mrs. H. T. Smith, Toronto—survive her.

—Clifford Calverley, the injured high wire artist who performed here, has not been improving as well as could be wished. Dr. Sweetman, of Toronto, performed an operation on one of his arms Wednesday, the wound in which showed a tendency to reopen.

—The chief of police has received word from the Columbus (Ohio) Insane Asylum asking him to be on the lookout for a patient named Angus Carroll, who escaped from there about a week ago. He is described as being fair complexioned, smooth shaven, and a painter and cigarmaker by trade.

THE WALKERS ARE READY

To Take Over the London and Port Stanley Railroad

As Soon as the City Clears the Track by Furnishing Freight Terminals—The G. T. R. Station To Be Used.

Superintendent Woollett, the able superintendent of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railroad, the new lessees of the L. and P. S. R., left for home to-day after a conference with the city authorities as to the transfer of the latter road. The outcome seemed to be very satisfactory to both parties, and a few days will probably see London's great and independent railroad operated by the men of capital and experience who have contracted so to do.

"We are ready to take over the London and Port Stanley whenever it suits the city's convenience," said Mr. Woollett in reply to an ADVERTISER reporter's question. "Of course they are obliged to furnish us with the necessary terminals. We wish proper freight accommodation here and they have that matter under consideration now. When the freight terminals are provided I suppose the city will give the M. C. R. the required ten days' notice, and we will begin operations at the expiry of that."

"Are the passenger terminals settled?" Mr. Woollett replied that the entire question of terminals rested with the city. He understood, however, that the city had secured the use of the Grand Trunk station for the L. and P. S. R. It was not so, he said, that his company would use G. T. R. rolling stock. They would supply their own, and it would be of good quality.

Mr. Woollett denied the report that there were bickerings between the L. E. and D. R. and the M. C. R. over the latter's running powers on the L. and P. S. R. under the new lease. Their relations had always been of the most friendly character and he anticipated no friction. Yes, he thought a steamboat service would be furnished at Port Stanley.

THE CITY MOVING.

"The whole thing will be settled within a week," said Mayor Essary to an ADVERTISER reporter this morning. "The matter of a freight station is the only part that still remains unsettled, and we are busy now making satisfactory arrangements to supply that deficiency. As soon as that is attended to the required ten days' notice will be given the M. C. R. It may be necessary to see President Leydard. He is away just at present, and that may cause a slight delay."

It is understood that President Leydard is at the Mid-Winter Fair in California. The G. T. R. yardmen here have orders to keep the switch running between the L. and P. S. road and the G. T. R. yard clear of standing cars, beginning on Monday next, April 3.

The city is in active negotiations with the G. T. R., with a view to securing the use of the G. T. R. freight house here until a permanent place is provided.

A REMARKABLE DEBATE

Between the A. P. A. Leader and Ignatius Donnelly—The Latter Wins.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 29.—Over 2,000 interested hearers, among them many ladies, were present last night at the debate on the A. P. A. question between Ignatius Donnelly and the A. P. A. leader, Walter Sims, held at the Academy of Music. Sims attempted to prove that Catholics, as subjects of the Pope, could not be true American citizens, because they could be influenced by the head of the church in their actions as citizens. Mr. Donnelly met the charge by proving that Catholics themselves, wherever the head of the church had grown to be too domineering, had rebelled, as is proven by the treatment the Pope had received at the hands of the Italians, a Catholic nation, and the order of the same Government forbidding the Catholic priests from entering public schools.

Mr. Donnelly was awarded the verdict, as the majority of those present were anti-A. P. A's. The debate lasted two and a half hours, and no demonstration of any kind was made.

The Horses Returned Alone.

CANNINGTON, Ont., March 29.—Last night William Towhy, a young man who resided here, while returning from Sunderland, where he had been yesterday, found out of the rig, and the horses came back alone. Some parties went to look for him and found him about two and a half miles from town lying on the road dead. Mr. Towhy was about 24 years of age, a painter by trade, and had been a resident of Cannington for several years.
