Left When Japanese Came.

Washington, Sept. 8.—Acting Secretary Ade has been informed by the Japanese legation here that Capt. Roschell, who undertook to lay claim to Marcus Island and take possession, arrived at that island on July 30 last. He was met there by a Japanese warship, the commander of which endeavored to him the letters addressed by the state department, pointing out the advisability of his avoiding any forcible demonstration to support his claim. He has since then refused the letters as sufficient and left the island about a week later. He has not lost any right he might have had, according to the state department officials, and if he has any just claim, it may be pursued to a conclusion in the usual diplomatic channels.

A Chicago Scandal.

Chicago, Sept. 8.—Indictments were returned Friday against four men implicated in the Masonic Fraternity Temple Association tax-friking scandal, which has taken up the time of a special grand jury all week, and which county officials believe will result in uncovering a conspiracy to mulct the county of hundreds of thousands of dollars of taxes annually. The men against whom true bills are returned are: Luke Wheeler, charged with conspiracy to defraud; Capt. Edward Williams, manager of the Masonic Temple, charged with uttering a forged instrument and conspiracy; James B. Foy, conspiracy to defraud; John J. Healy, jun., conspiracy to defraud.

MAN IMPALED ON PITCHFORK

Farm Laborer Meets Death in a Terrible Form.

LADY KILLED AT CROSSING

Soldier Loses His Life by Magazine Explosion—Three Drownings—Other Casualties.

Belleville, Ont., Sept. 8.—Patrick Wilm lost his life in Tyendinaga, near this city, working with a threshing machine. Wilm was descending a ladder with a pitchfork in his hand, when one of the rounds of the ladder broke and he fell to the floor beneath. The handle of the fork broke and penetrated his abdomen to a depth of over a foot. The poor fellow died to death in five minutes. He was a married man of 45 years of age.

FOUND IN THIS SLIP.

Toronto, Sept. 8.—The body of an unknown man was found floating in the Yonge street slip Saturday morning. The body, which has apparently been in the water for some time, was that of a young man of about 22, of fair complexion, about five feet tall; black shirt and coat, and gray trousers with black stripes. There was a ring on his right hand. The body is at the morgue.

KILLED AT GRADE CROSSING.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Sept. 8.—While driving across the G. R. and I. tracks, about a mile south of Plainwell, Saturday, Mrs. V. H. Hawley, aged 35, one of the most prominent women of that place, was struck by an extra north bound engine in charge of Engineer Ames and instantly killed. The carriage was smashed to bits and the horse killed. Mrs. Hawley was thrown nearly 100 feet and when picked up a few minutes after the accident her life was extinct. Mrs. Hawley was 35 years of age. Her husband, Dr. C. W. Hawley, died only three weeks ago.

MAGAZINE EXPLODES.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 8.—One of the Government powder magazines at old Fort Winthrop, on Governor's Island, Upper Boston Harbor, blew up last evening with a detonation that was apparent all over the city, and which was heard at points 20 miles away. The explosion is supposed to have been caused by boys setting fires on the island. One dead man and five injured were brought to the city by the police boat, and while it is believed that this is the extent of the casualties, it is possible that others may be found suffering from the force of the concussion. The dead man is Cotter, but further than this nothing is known about him.

SUICIDE OF A PHYSICIAN.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 6.—A man known as Dr. D. S. Waterous, of 3713 Elmwood Place, Chicago, committed suicide here by taking morphine. He left a note to his employer, the proprietor of a news room in this city, saying that he would kill himself, but gave no reason. Waterous had lived here since last February. He was between 50 and 60 years of age. Nothing is known of his past history.

"PEWEE" JOHNSON

FREEZING WEATHER AND HAIL

The Alleged Murderer Captured Near the Suspension Bridge.

Heavy Frosts in New York State—Storm at St. Catharines.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 7. — "Pewee" Johnson, the negro, who is charged with having shot and killed on Saturday at the Kenilworth crossing point last week during a quarrel over a game of craps, was captured at Suspension Bridge, N. Y., this afternoon. Johnson fled into the woods after the shooting at Kenilworth and crossed to the Canadian side of the Niagara River early the next morning.

The fugitive was seen and recognized by the Canadian frontier police, and a chase began which lasted two days and two nights, the pursuers frequently coming into close quarters with the negro desperado and on two occasions exchanging shots
