## SPREADING RAILS WRECKED TRAIN

Engineer Was Killed and Four Trainmen Injured.

AGED MAN FROZEN IN STREET

Prominent Citizen of Waterloo Killed by Trolley Car—List of Other Casualties.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 14.—The St. Paul passenger train on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy road, due in St. Louis at 5:55 p.m., and running 30 miles an hour to make up lost time, was wrecked last evening by spreading rails, five miles northeast of Alton, Ill., killing the engineer, Frank Horn, of Beardstown, Ill., and injuring four trainmen. No passengers were injured beyond receiving minor bruises.

**FROZEN TO DEATH.**  
Saginaw, Mich., Jan. 14.—Frozen to death in the streets was the fate which came to Frederick Dengler, an aged resident of this city, Monday evening. Dengler evidently wandered off, or lost his way, for he was found lying on Wheeler street, near the Michigan Central crossing. The snow about him was beaten down, showing that the aged man had evidently attempted to raise, after becoming chilled.

**KILLED BY TROLLEY CAR.**  
Waterloo, Ont., Jan. 14.—Adam Doering, proprietor of a laundry, was instantly killed while attempting to board a Berlin and Waterloo street car, opposite the hospital, last night. The deceased was on his way to a hockey match at Waterloo. The snow is very deep at that place, and the street railway was keeping men shoveling off the curbs. The Bridgeport car was coming to Waterloo, loaded with boys and hockey players, and coming down the grade, was halted by Mr. Doering. He attempted to get on the front end, but failed, and the car struck him on the side of the head with great force, causing instant death. Deceased was about 36 years of age, and leaves a wife and family.

## IN SYMPATHY WITH CANADIANS

Mr. Chamberlain's Position Re Cattle Embargo.

MEANS FOR REMOVAL SUGGESTED

British Agent Thinks a Protest by Dominion Government Would Be Effective.

Montreal, Jan. 14.—William Henderson, a member of the County Council of Perthshire, and the accredited delegate to Canada of the Canadian Cattle Importation Association, a vast organization which takes in the whole co-operative movement in Great Britain, with 8,000,000 consumers directly interested, including the Butchers' Association of London, with its affiliated associations throughout the whole length and breadth of the country, is in Montreal with the Scotch currier, Mr. Henderson has an important mission to Canada. He will leave for Ottawa in a few days, to confer with the Dominion Government regarding steps to be taken for the removal of the embargo now in force against Canadian cattle entering Great Britain. Regarding the means to be taken to this end, Mr. Henderson said:

"There is only one way, but it will be effective. The Canadian Parliament must pass a strong resolution showing the unjust manner in which her cattle trade has been slandered by this pleuro pneumonia fiction. This resolution must be transmitted through the Colonial office to the Imperial Government. Mr. Chamberlain will do the rest. The Colonial Secretary is thoroughly in sympathy with the movement. The press of Great Britain is unanimous in support of the removal of the embargo, and a great number of members of Parliament have decided to support the abolition of the restrictions. The country is thoroughly aroused on the subject. It is now put before the electors at every election, and it played a very considerable part in the great victory of Mr. C. D. Ross in the Newmarket constituency a few days ago. I am in a position to say that no Government will now dare to shelve the question, so thoroughly has the agitation been worked up."

"The embargo will never be lifted through any representation made to the department of the Right Hon. R. W. Hannbury, president of the British Board of Agriculture, who has handled the subject in a very narrow, and, I must say, incapable manner."

"This minister has unfavourably taken the side of the breeders, who naturally desire the maintenance of the embargo, and who form a ridiculously small proportion of those in Great Britain interested in the subject. The Cobden Club thoroughly indorses our position, and will work in our support."

"This unjust embargo now in force against Canadian cattle entering Great Britain," added Mr. Henderson, "must be abolished, and the time is at hand when the Imperial Government will realize that this legislation has struck a cruel blow at the best interests of Great Britain and Canada. When the matter shall have been properly presented to the British House of Commons, no Government, Liberal or Conservative, will have the hardihood to resist a demand which is today backed up by 8,000,000 consumers throughout the British Isles."

Speaking of the class of cattle raised in the Dominion, Mr. Henderson said: "During the years of experience we had in feeding Canadian cattle, we found them the healthiest, the best thriving and the best paying, beyond comparison, of any cattle we ever handled."

## WILL BE DISTINCT CORPORATION

A Plain Statement Regarding the Grand Trunk Pacific.

WILL GET NO GRANT OF LAND

What Mr. Sifton Says About the New Scheme—Canadian West Neglected by British.

London, Jan. 14.—To correct any misunderstanding and to dispel fears that the Grand Trunk Railway Company's financial position might be jeopardized by the Grand Trunk Pacific commitments, it is announced today that the Grand Trunk Pacific will be an absolutely separate corporation, under the control of the Grand Trunk Company, but not guaranteed financially in any way by the older company. It is added that the form in which the scheme will ultimately go through will probably be dependent to a great extent on the subsidies obtained from the Canadian Government.

**MR. SIFTON'S STATEMENT.**  
Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 13.—Hon. Clifford Sifton, who arrived here yesterday, says his trip through the States was to get an opportunity for a personal examination of the conditions of work relating to immigration to Canada from the States. He had visited the most important centers, and gone over details of the work of numerous agents, and found things on the whole satisfactory.

Regarding the Grand Trunk Pacific, he said the necessity for additional facilities must be recognized, and he thought the road would afford to the west great benefits in opening up new territory and relieving congestion of traffic. In regard to the subsidies, he said when the Grand Trunk makes a proposition the Government will consider it; but then it is useless to discuss the matter. Sifton added, however, "You may say positively that there won't be any grant of land to the Grand Trunk Pacific line."

**NEGLECT OF THE WEST.**  
Lord Strathcona spoke at the Royal Assiniboia Institute last night, when, in a paper read by Albert Hukman, Canadian Government agent, the British people were charged with neglecting Western Canada more than any other section of the Dominion. It is, however, thanks to the energies of such men as Lord Strathcona, that a new era has dawned. The idea that the American invasion involved the slightest danger to British interests is ridiculous. The majority of incoming Americans appreciated British institutions, and became good Canadian citizens with great rapidity. The investment of so many American millions in Canadian lands is but forging one more chain in the existing informal alliance, the greatest in history, and known as the Anglo-American confederation.

**WHY STOP AT TORONTO?**  
The following dispatch, published in Australian papers, provokes the inquiry whether Montreal and Toronto should not be similarly treated. "The King is pleased to approve of the title of Lord Mayor being conferred upon the mayors of Melbourne and Sydney. Such is the effect of a message received from the Governor-General of the future the mayors will be entitled to be called right honorable. The wives of the lord mayors will be entitled to lady mayors."

**BADLY HANDLED.**  
Sir Frederick Young, vice-president of the Royal Colonial Institute, who has taken a very active part in promoting the permanent union of the mother country and colonies, writing to the London Standard of Commerce of the Imperial defense, says: "The colonies have not been approached in the tenderest or most tactful spirit. It has been too prominently urged that they have a duty to perform."

**HEARTY WELCOME.**  
At the meeting of the Council of the London Chamber of Commerce, Sir Albert Kaye Rolit, president of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom, said nothing could exceed the heartiness of the welcome, and the courtesy and hospitality to the delegation from the chambers of commerce on their visit to Canada and the United States.

**METHODISTS IN CANADA.**  
Clement Von Berg, at a meeting of the London Wesleyan Methodist Council yesterday, presented a report of his recent visit to Canada. He said that the Methodist of the city of Toronto were taking the leading and commanding positions in everything that affects the citizen.

There is now a strong probability that the Commonwealth of Australia will send teams to compete at the National Rifle Association's meeting at Bisley, which commences on July 8.

**Peary's Ambition.**  
St. Johns, Nfld., Jan. 14.—It is believed here that Lieut. Robert E. Peary has decided to make another attempt to reach the north pole. Capt. Samuel Bartlett, of Brigus, Nfld., Lieut. Peary's ice navigator, is in St. Johns today, arranging to charter one of the largest steamers for a voyage north next summer. Lieut. Peary's steamer, Windward, is said to be inadequate for the large outfit to be taken on the proposed trip.

**Good Roads Movement.**

Toronto, Jan. 14.—The first application for allotments of the million dollar good roads fund, set aside by the Ontario Government two sessions ago, have been received by the Commissioner of Public Works. The first county to receive its share of the grant will be Simcoe. At the recent municipal elections a bylaw to take over 400 miles of township roads and organize a county system was carried by a majority of 1,457. The Government's contribution will be \$50,000. The County of Wentworth is raising a bylaw \$98,000 to construct a county road system, and has already paid \$63,000 for toll roads. An application for a good roads grant has been put in under the terms of the act. Wentworth will receive \$20,000. The County of Lanark has a bylaw in shape to take over 100 miles of road and form them into county system, and will receive \$25,000.

## Inhuman Treatment.

Washington, Jan. 13.—Mrs. Susan B. Beers, wife of John Beers, of Galesburg, Franklin Township, her son, Elijah Beers, and a hired man, Frank Gordon, were arraigned here today, charged with inhuman treatment of the woman's husband.
