London, Aug. 31. — M. Koretiyo Takahashi, the financial commissioner of Japan, in an interview today, said: "The Japanese Government in prosecuting the war, never had in mind the question of having to depend upon the

indemnity. The Government had prepared itself for any emergency, and at the present moment there is no less

than \$175,000,000 untouched in London, Germany and the United States. This being the case, I see no necessity for the issue of a new loan. Had peace not been concluded, my Government would have raised

So if Japan has in view a new plan for the issue of a fresh loan, it will be for the purpose of converting a previous loan bearing high interest into a new loan bearing a lower rate.
