ALLEGED BIGAMIST CORNELIA MARLATT

West London Woman Taken into Custody on a Serious Charge.

Detectives Nickle and Egerton last night arrested a young woman who resided at No. 14 Argyle street, West London, on a charge of bigamy. In the warrant she is called Cornelia Marlatt, and it is alleged that she is the lawful wife of John Marlatt. It is said that on Feb. 15 she did unlawfully go through the form of marriage with Aylmer Schram in Port Huron, the object of crossing the line for the ceremony being to evade the law. The arrest was made on a warrant issued at the instance of the crown, and not of Marlatt. Mrs. Schram or Marlatt is about 24 years of age and of prepossessing appearance. Aylmer Schram, her alleged second husband, is employed at McSweeney's. All the parties interested in the case are former residents of Aylmer.

THE J. B. HILL CASE

The St. Thomas Merchant Arraigned at the Toronto Sessions.

Toronto, March 21.—J. B. Hill, of St. Thomas, was arraigned in the session before Judge Morgan and a jury this afternoon on charges of fraud. He is accused of having obtained goods worth \$1,288.57 from St. F. McKinnon & Co., goods valued at \$800 from John Macdonald & Co., goods worth \$1,182 from The Canadian Dyeing and Finishing Company, and goods worth \$500 from Gordon, Mackay & Co., all with intent to defraud, it is alleged.

TROUBLE COULD NOT BE SETTLED

London Presbytery Advised Dutton Pastor to Resign—Calls Sustained.

At the meeting of the Presbytery of London, held at Dutton yesterday, a resolution was passed advising the pastor of the Dutton church, Rev. James Steven, to resign his charge. Mr. Steven succeeded Rev. Thomas Wilson, as pastor, when the latter came to East London, but he has not, apparently, been able to work in harmony with some members of the congregation, and recently an existing difficulty was brought to the attention of the presbytery. As the trouble could not be settled satisfactorily to the parties concerned, the presbytery took the course of advising Mr. Steven to tender his resignation.

PAVEMENT MEETS THE USUAL DOOM

Richmond Street Initiative, From Fullarton to Oxford, is Knocked Out.

It is understood that the petition of John Jennings and others against the construction of an asphalt pavement on Richmond street, between Fullarton and Oxford streets, is sufficiently signed, and the initiative has been consequently knocked out. Around the city hall it is said that the city will now wash its hands clean of the matter. If the Richmond street people do not want a pavement, it is their own affair, several of the aldermen said today.

It is understood, however, that certain property owners on the street are willing to pay for a vitrified brick pavement, and this may be initiated. There is also some talk of a Warren bitulithic petition being sent around.

It is probable that the board of works will shortly take up for reconsideration several petitions for pavements which were presented last year, but were filed by the council. The petitions were not acted upon because the council refused to allow the petitioners to serve notice on the city.

The petitions referred to include a pavement for Clarence street, from Dundas street to the G. T. R.; one for William street, from the G. T. R. to King street; one for Wellington street, from Wellington to Colborne streets.

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
