

## BLACK THOUSANDS WELCOME CHAMPION

All Negro Population of Chicago  
Out to Meet Him.

### "OH YOU JACK JOHNSON"

Aged Mother Weeps as Conquering  
Son Comes Home and Has Chicken  
and Watermelon Prepared.

Chicago, July 7.—Jack Johnson, champion of all prize fighters, tonight is once more home with his mammy, and his automobile. In ancient Greece a returning victor was let into his native city with his spoils through a breach in the wall and adulating compatriots rent the air with acclamation. Today John Arthur Johnson, best of modern gladiators with the modern cestus, came into the city with his following through a solid wall of people. Chicagoans lined the sidewalks with solid ranks to catch a glimpse of this modern but dusky Pollux.

The champion announced that all tentative plans for the future were off. "Sam Langford?" he asked. "That makes me laugh. I am not running around now, looking for fights. Let Langford put up his \$20,000 first, then let me talk. Just now I am going to rest. I'm going to New York Sunday afternoon to begin a 30-week vacation vaudeville tour, at least I have that many weeks at my disposal. I may accept offers to go to Europe.

"Quit? Well I never told anyone I would quit, but it looks as though I have to."

Five thousand members of his race and a large number of white persons made the living wall at the Chicago and Northwestern Railway station, where Johnson landed on his return from Reno. Policemen were swept aside when the fighter, looming above the crowd, fought his way smilingly through hand claps and pats on the back to a waiting automobile. A line of garishly decorated automobiles containing newspaper workers (amply cared for at Johnson's personal request), followed his machine.

Oh, You Johnson!  
With a rush and a roar that left all behind Jack in his new racing car dashed madly home, where his mother, Mrs. Tiny Johnson, and the members of his family, waited in the midst of another crowd of thousands.

Flags waved, an ornately attired drum major of a negro regiment of state militia swayed to the rhythm of "America" and "Mistah Johnson, Turn Me Loose," and other similarly "patriotic airs." In the midst of a mighty roar of "Oh, you, Jack Johnson," the champion alighted at his house.

He pushed his way into the house amid deafening roars, and with tears streaming down his face, embraced his mother. Behind him a compatriot struggled through the crowd, bearing aloft a smoked bacon side, symbolic of Johnson's own message home:

Back With the Bacon.  
"I'm coming home with the bacon," "You don't need no bacon, chill," cried the aged mother of Jack. "Oh want to tell you I've got a mighty fine chicken cookin' out heah in the kitchen and you know how you likes watamelon? We'll have got some dandies, Jack."

The champion appeared on the balcony of his home and paused suddenly as he caught a camera pointed his way, lest the picture be spoiled. He seemed about to speak, but instead turned about and soon appeared at the street door, struggling through the crowds to his automobile. It went 71 miles an hour for a while today, till it was slowed down by a park policeman.

"Here goes the profits," laughed Jack, but the policeman clasped the champion's hand and clouted him on the back. Leaning over he whispered: "Don't tell anyone, you old war horse, but I won \$20 on you."
