FLANNIGAN SEES JEFF

Negro's Manager Expects That Battle Will Be Long Drawn Out One.

Reno, Nev., June 24.—Promoter Tex Rickard and Tom Flannigan were all prepared this morning for Jack Johnson's arrival from San Francisco. Flannigan had engaged two automobiles and a truck to transport the champion's party, bag and baggage, to the roadhouse which is to serve as the negro's training quarters. The question as to what effect the sharp change in altitude will have on Johnson is being given much thought by Flannigan. He says he will advise against heavy road work, and expects the champion will continue his training by exercise for several days after his arrival. Boxing, he thinks, will constitute Johnson's main work here. Flannigan has been keeping an eye on Jeffries since he came to Reno. He says he is much impressed with Jeffries' appearance, and expects to see a long-drawn-out battle between him and the negro.

Out at Moana Springs, Jeffries is taking life easy. Not even the Sullivan incident has caused a perceptible ripple in the cheerful spirits he shows. He is replying to Nevada, and his trainers express themselves as fully satisfied that no ill effects have been suffered from coming here. With both fighters settled in their respective camps, work on the arena under way, and without the prospect of any further interference in preparation for the battle, Reno is settling down to comparative quiet. "Quiet" is strictly comparative, however, for not in many years, citizens say, has the town sheltered so cosmopolitan a gathering as now nightly throngs its cafes and places of chance. That sort of thing is a great novelty for the eastern visitors, and most of them seem bent on missing nothing that flavors of the stories they have read of life in the great west. Reno herself is beginning to take notice of her gambling hall activities.

TELEPHONE CO. CANNOT PUT CONDUITS IN STREETS

City Solicitor Meredith Gave His Opinion on the Subject.

The Bell Telephone Company cannot place conduits under any streets in the city without the consent of the council.

At the meeting of the board of works last night the opinion of City Solicitor Meredith was read to the effect that there was nothing in the agreement between the company and the city giving them the right to place their wires underground. The company must obtain the consent of the city council. So far they have been unable to obtain that consent.

The opinion of City Solicitor Meredith is as follows in part: "The exclusive right is granted to the Bell Telephone Company to use the public streets and lanes of the city of London as in the agreement provided. The agreement makes no provision whatever for placing any ducts or wires in or under the highways, but provides for the placing of poles in the highways, and the stringing of wires on such poles. In my opinion the Bell Telephone Company have not the right, without the consent of the council of the corporation, to place their wires or ducts in or under the public streets or lanes of the city."

Meet the City.

Ald. Tancock thought that the committee should ask the water commissioners to meet them, and make an effort to get the company to come in with the city in their underground work.

Mayor Beattie pointed out that there was nothing before them from the water commissioners, and suggested that the board wait until such a time as something official did come before them.

Ald. Saunders moved then that the matter lay over until the next meeting of the board, and that the manager of the company be requested to appear before the board and discuss the question. This motion carried.

It is understood that the water commissioners will take up the matter at the meeting to be held this afternoon.

ATTEMPTS SUICIDE.

Rochester, N. Y., June 23. Believing she had been deserted by her husband, Mrs. R. W. Fraser, of 642 Eastern avenue, Toronto, yesterday afternoon attempted suicide, by swallowing carbolic acid. She is at the Homeopathic Hospital and will probably recover.

The woman, who is twenty-five years old, told the landlady at 67 Williams street that she would kill herself before night. She was watched, but the police were not notified. She managed to enter her room unnoticed, and swallowed the acid. She wrote a note, which was left on the dresser, saying that she had no desire to live longer.
