LONDON IN FARGICAL CONTEST

Ludicrous Efforts of Players in Heavy Snow Drives Crowd Away.

STIRRET'S AWFUL
RUN A "FEATURE"

Oil Town Man Ran Ball Out of Own Goal and Scored Try Unassisted.

Petrolia O. R. F. U. Juniors came to London Saturday for the second match of the semi-finals in this district, and as darkness fell over Tecumseh Park, the local would-be left the field and a 12 to 2 victory to the visitors.

A week ago in Petrolia the Oil Town men were credited with a win by the same score, the tally on the round being 24 to 4. They now go down to Hamilton where they will grapple with the Alerts in a championship set-to.

The conditions at the game were vile, and in a short time the players who were not in the best possible condition began to sag at the knees, and their chins hanging on their chests after the manner of Scrooge's famous ghost of the cash-box fall.

HALF FOOT OF SNOW MADE HEAVY GOING.

The gridiron was covered with several inches of snow, despite the efforts of the local management, which had had a team of horses and a scraper on the job all day. The lines were marked off by digging strokes in the "beautiful" snow had been chopped off about one-third of the field along the west side, and this piece of good footing proved to be a fine thing for the Petrolians.

The most ridiculous piece of work came in the second quarter when the visitors scored a touch on a run the entire length of the gridiron.

"Tidy" Sage, who played a great game, and whose punting gave the locals practically all of their opportunities, fumbled the ball several yards behind the Petrolia line. Stirret, who had developed a lame leg, and who was to have been taken out as soon as he substituted for his harness on, caught the piskin, and commenced a chase down the field. He was on the good going, while the Londoners were spread out in the heavy stuff on the east side. They started across after him, however, but gradually quit the job as hopeless as he approached the London goal. Stirret enjoyed the joke keenly, and centering behind the line deposited the ball on the snow and rolled on it.

LONDON LEFT FIELD BEFORE FINISH.

At the commencement of the fourth quarter, the players having killed time at every opportunity, darkness spread over the park, and it was impossible to see the ball.

The crowd left the stands, preferring not to witness the last agonies. London left the field with a few minutes left to play, as nothing was to be gained by prolonging the trouble, and the officials appeared willing to let it last all night.

At the finish a row developed between the Petrolia banner and some of the officials. Dr. C. O. Fairbank, of Petrolia, charged one of the timekeepers with being crooked, and trouble followed in which all sorts of threats were made. The timekeeper admitted that he may not have understood the rules perfectly, but was willing to be shown, but the matter was allowed to drop.

Injuries came frequently, but as some of the players faked in order to delay things, it was impossible to tell how many were actually in trouble.

SAGE SUFFERED INJURY TO FOOT.

"Baldy" McQueen was kicked in the stomach and was laid out for a time. When play was resumed he was scarcely able to shout the signals, but at that he stayed with it and made as good a showing as many of those who did not mix as heartily in the battle. London suffered a serious loss in the final quarter, when Elmer Sage, the star of the game, strained a tendon in his left ankle. He hobbled off the field and had the member bandaged, returning shortly to work in the finish of the "contest." The big fellow's gameness was applauded. The only penalty was handed out to Crapper, of Petrolia, whose toe stopped in Londoners' ribs on several occasions. He spent three minutes on the side.

The officials appointed by the O. R. F. U. to handle the contest did not show up, and Mr. McInneson and Mike Fleming, of Petrolia, were selected to alternate as referee and umpire.

The tackling of Gilles, one of the younger members, featured the match, while Callahan, Chatto and McQueen also

showed class. The first score came in the opening quarter, when Sims was forced to rouge. Whitting counted one for Petrolia in the same manner on a punt by Whitting, shortly after.

COULD NOT CONVERT OWING TO SNOW.

Webb was bucked over for a try, which Crapper was unable to convert, as the snow was six or eight inches deep. Another rouge by Wetherall ended the quarter.

After that awful run by Stirret the crowd began to leave. It was not converted, but a little later Stirret, without being forced, dropped the ball behind the line, making no effort to run it out or punt. In the same quarter Sage punted behind the line, and Stirret ran it out, being tackled on the line. Petrolia tried a bucking game, and lost possession on yards in the scrimmage. London was gradually forced back, but when they did get it over a minute later they were penalized ten yards on Callahan's offense. There was little or no serious play thereafter, each player being winded by the heavy going.

AGE LIMIT 20 YEARS.

The proposition to make the age limit in the junior series 20 years instead of 19, as proposed last year, caused considerable discussion.

The amendment was moved by Jas. T. Southern, who made a strong speech in favor of the 20-year age limit. Bert Short seconded the motion.

Mr. Nelson spoke in favor of the 19-year-old clause.

Mr. Marriott pointed out that in his experience players under 19 years of age were not competent for junior hockey.

Mr. Lutz, of St. Thomas, said upon the action of the association depended the entrance of a junior team from that city.

Mr. Farquharson, of Stratford, said that the junior series should be a schooling ground for the youngsters. He favored the 19-year-old clause, as did Mr. Connolly, of Belleville.

Mr. O'Brien, of Peterboro, spoke in favor of the 20-year-old clause. The 19-year-old clause would mean laying down a juvenile series, he said.

Mr. Beaton, of Paris, also spoke in favor of the 20-year-old clause.

Speaking for Oshawa, Mr. Bradley suggested a trial of the 19-year-old clause for one year.

Mr. Sheridan, of St. Michael's, favored the 20-year-old clause, citing experiences in Toronto last winter. Mr. Doyle, of Newmarket, suggested the formation of a juvenile series for the youngsters.

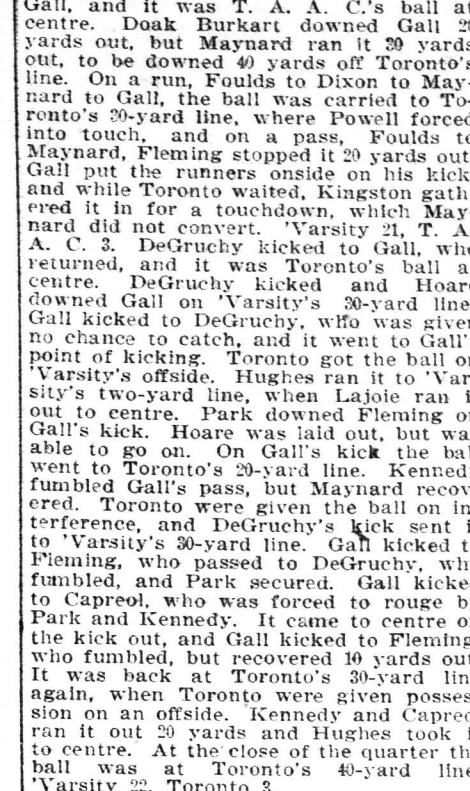
