The Remedy.

To double the number of men interested in missions would be five times as great as to double the amount of the contributions,

SPOKE ON CHINA

Interesting Address in London Junction Presbyterian Church.

A good attendance at the regular prayer meeting of the London Junction Presbyterian Church thoroughly enjoyed the genial missionary's address on Wednesday evening. In an address of over an hour, with the aid of a small map only, he covered that vast continent and the great problem of its future so simply, clearly earnestly as to convince his audience of the real possibility of a Christian China.

The address was unique in method of presentment, and dealt with the problem on broad statesmanlike lines. The doctor but touched on the revolution as indicating in the birth of the newest republic the logical sequence of Christian ideals. He emphasized the need of greater effort and sacrifice on the part of the Christian people at home, that our work as a church agency on China might at this juncture grasp its opportunity, and aid to the utmost the native Chinese church, to whom sooner or later will be committed the gigantic task of China's

At the close the doctor exhibited the flag of the new republic, in red, white and blue, explaining that the Chinese leaders fully realized the emblematic significance of these colors. He also exhibited a ten-dollar bill of the new republic, having its face value. A standing vote of thanks was awarded to Dr. McGillivray for his excellent lecture and after the usual closing exercises, a most enjoyable missionary meeting was brought to a close.

PRACTICAL USES OF FINGER PRINTS.

In the Argentine Republic the identification cards of policemen, coachmen, cab drivers, commissioners and servants have, since 1896, borne their finger prints. Upon all passports and bank receipts for deposits the imprint of the thumb must be made at time of delivery.

In Roumania, since 1903, the thumb print has been substituted for the cross made instead of signature by persons who cannot write. In the Philippine Islands those who cannot write are not obliged to be identified by witnesses at savings banks, but merely have to make their mark with their thumb

The same system has been used in the banks of Bengal for fifty years. In France, to put an end to the fraud of enlistment, desertion and re-enlistment for the bounty paid in the Foreign Legion, every man's finger prints are taken and kept on file.
