PEACE CONFERENCE MAY BEGIN TODAY

Plenipotentiaries Are To Be Welcomed By Sir Edward Grey.

TERMS OF THE ALLIES

Main Conditions Believed to Include the Immediate Surrender of Fortresses.

London, Dec. 15 .- Dr. Daneff, head of the Bulgarian plenipotentiaries, returned to London from Paris late tonight, and the historical peace conference is expected to open at noon tomorrow. Sir Edward Grey, the British secretary for foreign affairs, will make a brief speech of welcome, and after expressing the hope of a fruitful end of their labors, he will retire and leave the conference to deliberate in

private. The sessions will be held in the historic St. James' Palace, where the "Picture Gallery" has been selected as the conference room. It is a secluded apartment, and entirely shut off from the noise of the London streets.

The delegates spent a quiet day on Sunday. Nothing has transpired yet to show whether any serious difficulty is likely to arise over the attendance of the Greek delegates. Concerning the Austro-Servian controversy, the Balkan delegates think it the result of Austrian bluff. Main Conditions.

The main conditions of the Balkan allies include the immediate surrender of Scutari, Adrianople and Janina the garrisons of which will be granted full military honors; the evacuation of Eastern Europe by Turkey as far as East Tchatalja to a line which experts appointed by the contracting parties will delimit on the spot; the cession to Greece of all the Aegean islands, including Rhodes and eleven which Italy is keeping as a pledge for Turkish fulfillment of the treaty of Lausanne; the annexation of Crete to Greece and the payment of a war indemnity, and the expense sustained on account of the Turkish pris-

In return the allies will grant comamnesty to the Mussulman population in the territories they annex for any acts of hostility during the war; the return of all prisoners; the recognition of the spiritual sovereignty of the Sultan over Ottomans becoming subjects of the Balkan States, and the free administration by the Mussulmans of their pious funds in the Balkans.

A Naval Engagement. Athens, Dec. 14.-The report of the Minister of Marine says it was the Turkish cruiser Medjidieh which attempted to leave the Dardanelles. She was attacked by the Greek destroyers Lenchi and Sphendoul. Six other destroyers immediately came whereupon the Medjidieh sought the shelter of the forts. She ultimately returned to the Dardanelles after a lively cannonade on both sides.


