

The Hydroplane To Replace Ships

(Canadian Press.)

London, May 9.—Mr. A. V. Roe, one of the best-known aviators in England, makes the startling prophecy in the Daily Mirror this morning that the hydroplane of the future will carry one thousand passengers, and revolutionize ocean travel. He says the speed obtainable will be enormous, exceeding one hundred and fifty miles an hour, and, as the hydroplane will soon be as safe as any human invention can be, it will do away with sea-sickness. There is little doubt that ocean travellers would choose it in preference to a steamship.

If Mr. Roe's startling prophecy is ever realized, passengers from New York can be in London within 24 hours after their start.

TURK GOVERNOR OF RHODES A PRISONER OF ITALIANS

Before the Invaders' Occupation, Hundreds of Convicts Were Liberated.

London, May 8.—The Italian war office has been officially notified that the governor of the Turkish island of Rhodes, recently occupied by the Italians, has been captured and is held a prisoner of war. In addition to the governor, his two secretaries and four other Turkish officers were taken into custody.

Turks Release Convicts. Rome, May 8.—A dispatch from Rhodes says that before the Italian occupation of the city the Turks released 300 Anatolian convicts, who are now scattered through the interior and are joining the disbanded garrisons. It is feared they will organize into bands of brigands.

ULSTER DRILLS TO BE INVESTIGATED

British Government Wants the Names of Retired Officers in the Movement.

BIRRELL ON HOME RULE

Irish Secretary Says Local Executive Is Only Cure for Many Ills.

Belfast, May 8.—The drilling of the members of the Ulster clubs in Ulster has at length attracted the serious attention of the Government. The Lord Lieutenant's office in Dublin has made a requisition to the authorities for an immediate return of the names of all officers and non-commissioned officers, active or retired, who are engaged in drilling the members of the clubs and Orange lodges and the men in the factories and shipyards.

Mr. Birrell's Views. London, May 8.—Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, was the star speaker in today's debate on home rule in the House of Commons. He declared that the establishment of a strong executive in Ireland was the only cure for the ills of that country. It would prove to be the pulse of the whole machine. Its absence was the real source of all weakness and troubles both before and after the union.

There were, he said, tens of thousands among the Irish capable of undertaking the heavy responsibilities of government, as was proved by the way they carried on the local work. In giving the House of Commons information on the subject of Ireland he was, he said, generally merely a spokesman. He believed that Catholics and Protestants could work together for the common good of the people.

FUNERAL OF C. M. HAYS

Last Respects to Remains of Grand Trunk President.

Montreal, May 8.—This afternoon the remains of the late C. M. Hays were conveyed from the family residence on Ontario avenue to the last resting place in Mount Royal Cemetery. A short funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. Dr. Johnson, pastor of the American Church, of which the late president had been one of the most prominent members.

Despite the fact that the funeral had been announced to be private, a large number of friends of the late Mr. Hays assembled to pay a last tribute of respect to his remains. The general offices of the Grand Trunk were closed between two and three o'clock this afternoon.

HAMILTON STRIKE OVER

Bricklayers Reach Agreement With the Masters and Return to Work.

Hamilton, May 8.—The bricklayers returned to work this morning in pursuance of the terms of an agreement reached at the Waldorf Hotel yesterday afternoon. The agreement was arrived at as the result of a meeting called by President William Brown of the international union and Fourth Vice-President Thomas Izzard. The contractors were represented by George Webb, John Tope, Robert R. Laidlaw, John Stuart, W. H. Yates, chairman, and the local union by John T. Laidlaw, Alex. Macdonald, Fredrick French, chairman.

Those present represented the executive committees of their respective associations.

By the terms of the agreement the men returned to work this morning at a wage scale of 55 cents per hour, which would be in force until May 1, 1915. The men at the outset demanded 55 cents for the first year, 57 cents for the second year, and 59 cents for the third year; while the contractors offered 52 cents for the first year and 55 cents for the two following years.

The settlement was more in the form of a compromise.

QUEBEC SELECTS THE CANDIDATES

The Nominations Were Held on Tuesday for the Provincial Legislature.

GOVIN STANDS FOR TWO

Nominees Chosen for Every Riding for the Election on May Fifteenth.

Montreal, May 8.—Nominations were held throughout the province today, and the fight is on in real earnest. Sir Lomer Gouin will run in Portneuf and St. John's; Hon. C. R. Devlin will contest both Nicolet and Temiskaming, and Mr. A. Laverne is fighting Hon. L. A. Taschereau in Montmorency, as well as again contesting the old seat in Montmagny. Mr. Jean Prevost will contest the seat in L'Assomption, in addition to that in Terrebonne, which he has represented hitherto. There will be a three-cornered fight in Dorion division, where Mr. Arcand, the Labor candidate; Mr. P. Poirier, the Independent Labor candidate, and Mr. Pariseau, the Conservative candidate, will ask for the votes of the electors. At the last minute the name of Mr. Charles Bruchesi, brother of Archbishop Bruchesi, was put in nomination in St. Louis division. He will run as a straight Conservative candidate. This will make four candidates in St. Louis division—namely, Mr. Goffrey Langlois, retired member; Mr. N. Langlois, real estate agent, and Mr. Marcus Sperber, Conservative. There will be 82 members in the new House against 74 in the old. The Island of Montreal has 12 seats as a result of the recent revision.

STATE CONVENTION TO DECIDE THE ISSUE

Not Yet Certain Whether Taft or Roosevelt Will Have Texas.

(Canadian Press.)

Dallas, Texas, May 8.—It will require the state convention on May 25 to decide between President Taft and Col. Roosevelt as Texas' preference for the presidential nomination.

Col. Roosevelt had a substantial lead over Mr. Taft in the county convention returns received this forenoon, when three-quarters of the state's counties had been heard from. Contests and undetermined delegates, however, neutralized the effect of any lead for either candidate. The forenoon figures were: Roosevelt, 72 states; convention votes, 45; undetermined, 49; contested, 8. Taft, 45; undetermined, 49; contested, 8.
