SUFFRAGETTES CHANT PRAYERS IN CHURCH

Invasions in Both England and Scotland—Use Paint On Walls.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 15.—Suffragettes today chanted prayers in Westminster Abbey, Yorkminster and the Brighton Parish Church for their imprisoned colleagues. Sylvia Pankhurst has written the dean of Westminster, acquainting him with the intention of the East London suffragettes to march to the abbey next Sunday and participate in the evening service and pray for the success of their cause. In her letter she said she would be present personally and that she desired the dean to adapt the service to a special occasion for the suffragettes.

Paint Cathedral Walls. Birmingham, March 15.—Worshippers in the Cathedral today found the walls and floors of the edifice covered with suffragette proclamations painted in white letters a foot high, reading, "Votes for women. The clergy must rise in our behalf and stop the torturing of women in prison."

Every foot of space except the altar had a sign painted on it. The work is believed to have been that of women who concealed themselves in the Cathedral last night. It is thought it was done for the benefit of the judges of the assizes, who attended the service today. The assizes open here tomorrow.

In Glasgow Church. Glasgow, March 15.—A band of suffragettes rose in the Cathedral during the service today and chanted "Oh, Lord, we beseech Thee to save Emmeline Pankhurst, Helen Crawford and all the brave women who are suffering for their faith." The congregation took no notice of the demonstration.

QUICK WORK SAVES TALBOT ST. CHURCH

Several Hundred Dollars' Damage Done by Fire From Overheated Furnace.

Flames from an over-heated furnace set fire to the flooring in Talbot Street Baptist Church Sunday morning shortly after 9 o'clock, and caused damage in the neighborhood of \$250 before being subdued by the firemen. Members of the church were loud in their praise for the excellent work done by the department, many stating that the church would have been burned to the ground but for the prompt arrival of the brigade.

The fire did not interfere with the services of the Sunday.

WHITE PLAGUE 'EXPERT' VISITED CITY YEAR AGO

Sunday Was Anniversary of Dr. Friedmann's Treatment of London Patients.

Sunday was the anniversary of the visit to this city of Dr. Frederick Franz Friedmann, the German scientist, whose turtle serum was believed to be a cure for tuberculosis. Londoners who witnessed the scene which took place at the Institute of Public Health on that day will not soon forget his coming and the harvest of hopes it raised in the breasts of those afflicted with the dread malady. That no results followed the treatment administered only added pathos to the many sad scenes enacted on that day. None of the patients treated here benefited to any extent by the serum, and the treatment here, as elsewhere in Canada, proved a failure.

The visit of the famous scientist to London was brought about most unexpectedly. Hon. Adam Beck prevailing upon him to come here from Toronto. Nobody knew of his coming until a few hours before his arrival, but when the news spread a great crowd of people gathered in front of the Institute of Public Health, hours in the rain, waiting for his arrival. Many of the watchers were persons afflicted with the disease, and heart-rending scenes were witnessed as these presented themselves at the door in the hope of receiving treatment. Only a very limited number could be treated and the doctors selected only a few of the hundred or more patients on hand. The sudden transformation from hope to despair on the part of some of those rejected, made a never-to-be-forgotten impression on those who witnessed it.

The clinic at which the selected patients were treated was attended by nearly all the medical men of the city as well as a large number of medical students. The results were watched with a great amount of interest for several months after, but in every case there appeared to be no results either one way or the other, after the first effects of the serum had worn off. The treatment is now pretty generally regarded by the medical profession as a failure.

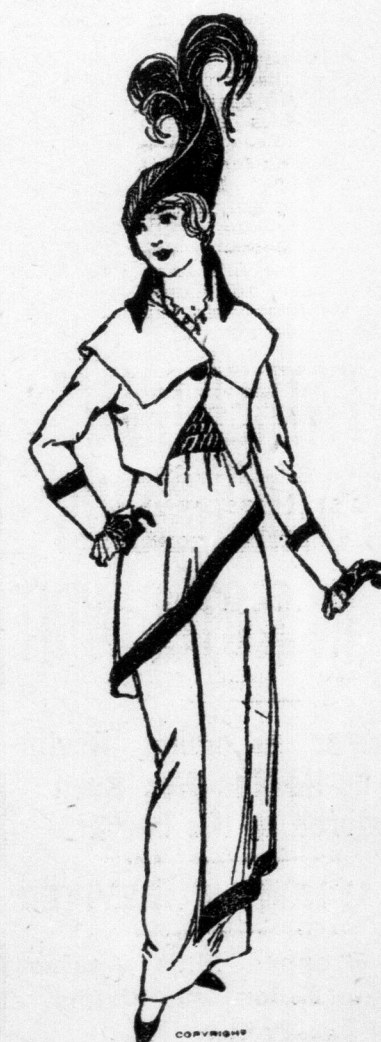

LABOR MEN UP IN ARMS

Toronto, March 15.—Local labor leaders have interested themselves in the report of the wholesale importation of Spaniards into Canada to work on contracts, especially on the new Welland Canal, and the minister of labor, Hon. T. W. Crothers, has promised to take steps to investigate the charge. It is said 300 Spaniards arrived in New York yesterday bound for Port Weller, Ont., to work on section No. 2 of the Welland Canal for the English contractors Baldry, Tenburg & Hutchinson. It is claimed by local labor officials that this is a breach of the fair wage clause in the act.

SEEDS FOR PUPILS

The London Horticultural Society now has a membership of about 300 and it is aimed to bring this number up to 500 before the end of this season. At a meeting of the directors last week a committee was appointed to arrange for the purchase and distribution of seeds among the school children, while another committee was named to arrange for a second lecture on horticultural subjects. Secretary A. M. Hunt was instructed to order the spring premiums, six varieties of perennial phlox, which are to be given to each member.

GAS FIRM AGREES TO PURIFY ITS PRODUCTS

Asks Three Months to Complete Its Improvements.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Galt, March 15.—Mayor Buchanan has received the long-promised formal agreement on the part of the Dominion Natural Gas Company to erect a purification plant at Tilbury, and supply a product free from offensive odor and health-imparting constituents. The company has been experimenting, and has successfully solved the problem of purification. A three months' limit is set for the completion of plans, and the public is asked in the meantime to bear patiently the situation created by an unlooked-for contingency.
