MUMMIFYING SECRET CLAIMED BY PARISIAN

Doctor Believes His Fluid and Process Are Like Old Ones.

PARIS, Oct. 7 .- After years passed in studying chemical traces in ancient Egyptian mummles, Dr. Edmond Bartha, of the Paris School of Practical Medicine, has announced the discovery of a new embaiming fluid that he asserts will maintain o lifelike appearance in corpses for a period of between twenty and fifty years.

Dr. Bartha in demonstrating his dis-

covery described how the same process and a fluid similar to his were undoubt-edly used in the times of the Pharaohs, except that the incisions probably were through the carotid artery, as the mum-mies he had examined showed no trace of femoral incisions, as now practiced. After a body has been embalmed for a week, he explained, the flesh and tissues harden, leaving the body as rigid as marble, and although time may de stroy the color effects produced by Dr. Bartha's fluid, he is of the opinion that the long lost secret of mummifying the dead has at last bee discovered will again be practiced generally in another decade.
