"As representative of the Protestant minority it is my duty to see that they get their share, and they do get their share. Grants this year to McGill, Laval and Montreal Universities were \$1,000,000 each. That is to say, the money was divided between Roman Catholic and Protestant institutions on a basis of two to one. As a matter of fact, the population is on a basis of eight Catholics to one Protestant in Quebec; so we cannot complain of that. There were grants of \$10,000 each made to nineteen classical colleges in the province, and \$40,000 to the Protestant in-stitutions as a compensation for this \$190,000.
