LONDON TROOPS RUSHED TO STRIKE AREA

Forest Fires in Minnesota Leave Death in Wake

SETTLERS FIGHT TO STAY BLAZE

Fall of Many Tiny Settlements Hangs on Weather

WIND IS CHIEF ENEMY

All Roads to Duluth Crowded With Women and Children.

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 18 .- Whippe to sudden fury by a brisk shifting wind, numerous forest fires in th wooded country north of here, wiped out two towns and several smalle settlements late yesterday, turned hundreds of persons out of thei homes and took a death toll variously placed at from 6 to 12.

Fears that the death toll would go beyond the reported total of 12 when additional advices were received today from the flame-swept areas, were expressed by scores of refugees, who were arriving here hourly from all

Hundreds Abandon Homes.

While four hundred men of the National Guard continued today the work of succoring the refugees, more than 2,000 forest rangers, settlers and others redoubled their efforts in fighting the flames, which already have destroyed the small towns of Cotton Central Lakes and White Face.

The fall of a score of other tiny settlements scattered over St. Louis and Lake counties hung on the weather today. Only rain or a calm could save these places. Terrific winds were the chief enemies of the fire fighters yesterday. New fires were reported early today in several sec-
