This smart sport dress with scarf to match is made of white crepe and attractively checked and bordered in black, making a very striking contrast to this absolutely straightline model



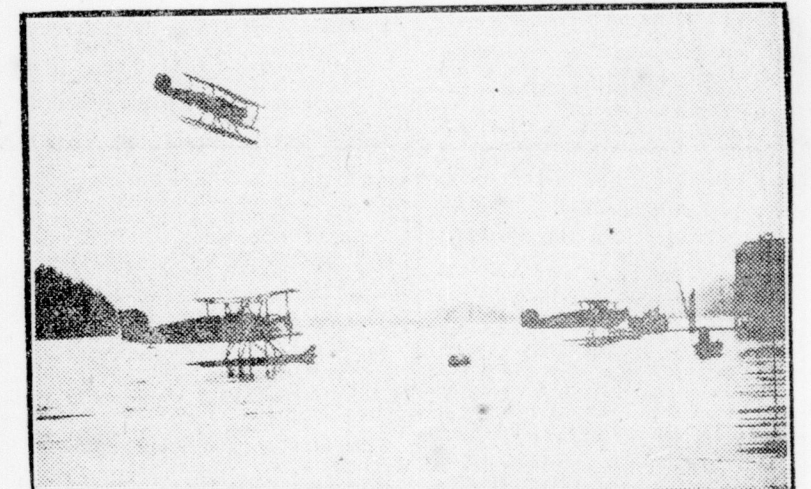

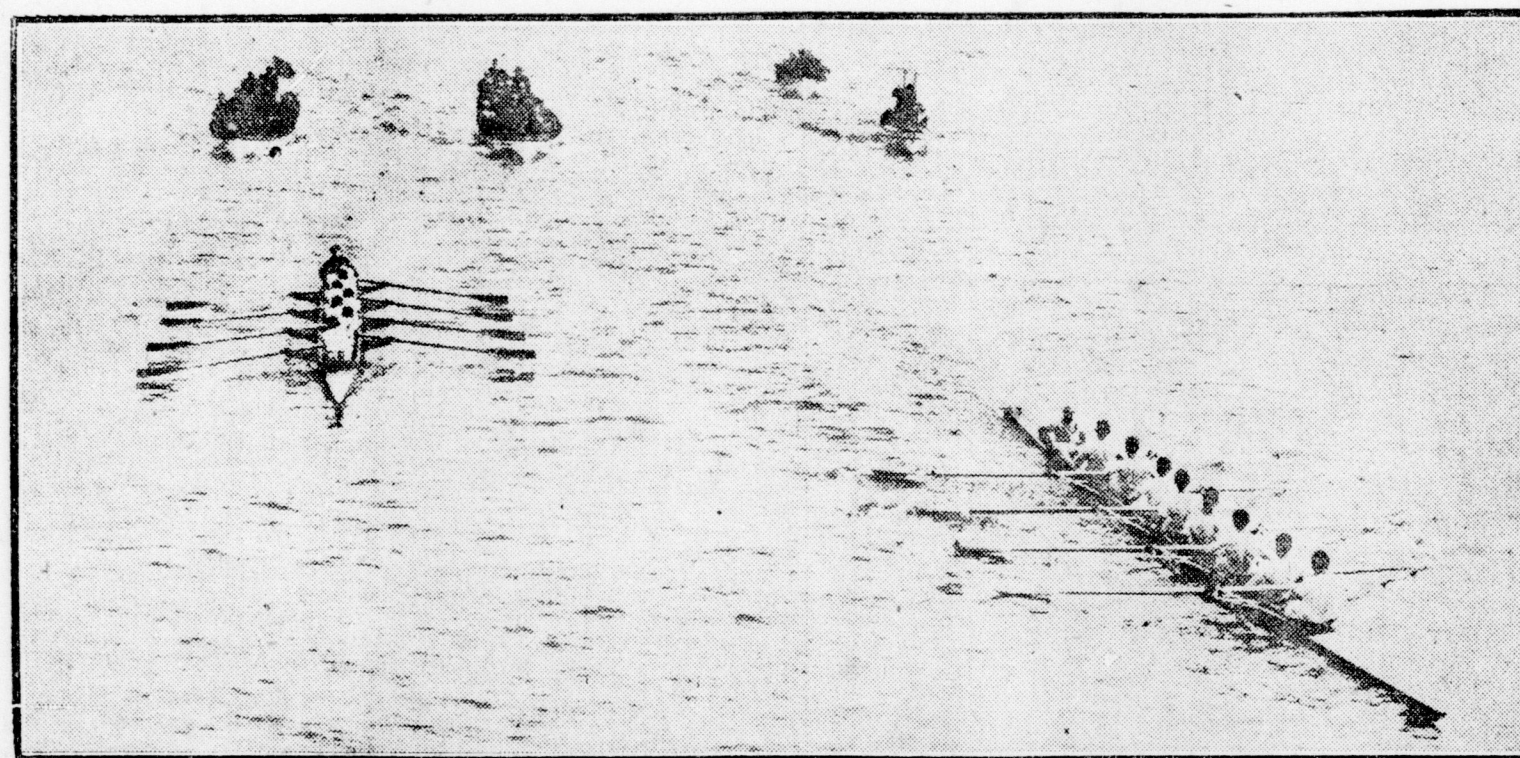
Turkish Mohammedan women no longer go about with their faces veiled, as the photograph shows, but they still hide their features, when they notice the eye of the camera looking their way



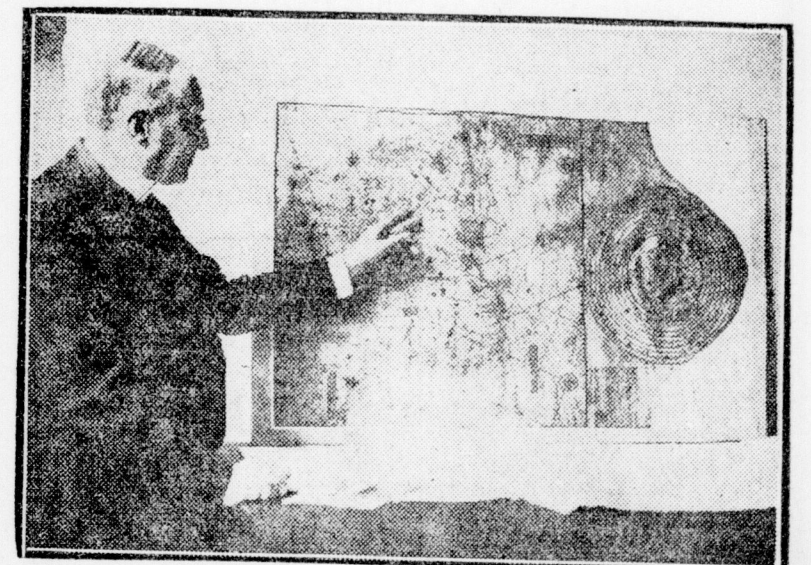

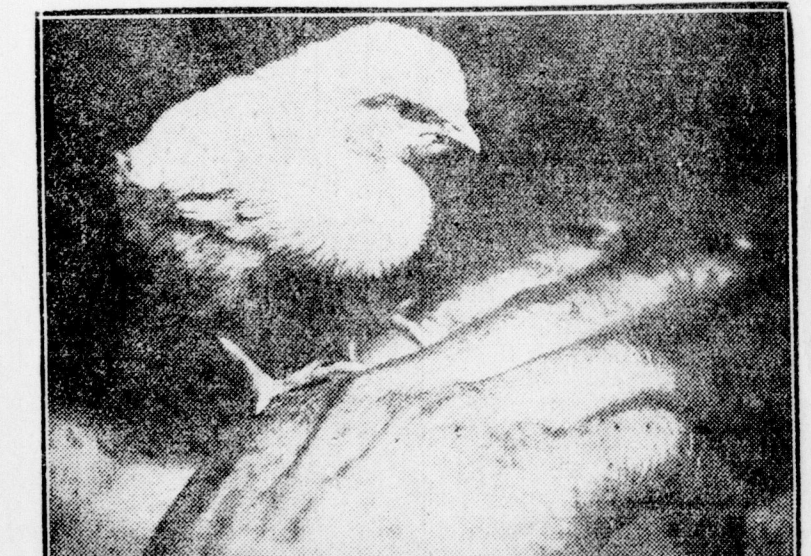
