

**RAILWAY BOARD
THROWS OUT PACT**

Commissioners Order With-
drawal of Crow's Nest
Pass Agreement.

IN FIFTEEN DAYS

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, Oct. 14.—The board of railway commissioners today issued an order disallowing the Crow's Nest Pass rates and requiring them to be withdrawn from operation within 15 days from today.

The majority report, which was prepared by Commissioner A. C. Boyce, and is concurred in by the chief commissioner and by Commissioners Calvin, Lawrence and Nantel, disallows the Crow's Nest Pass rates and orders that they be withdrawn from operation within 15 days from the date of judgment. The net result is that railway freight rates remain as they were on July 6 last.

Flour Rates Remain.
Eastbound rates on grain and flour which were in effect before July 6 are not affected by the judgment.

The judgment specifically disallows those freight tariffs which were filed by the Canadian railways following the revival of the Crow's Nest Pass agreement on June 6 of this year. While eastbound rates on British Columbia fruit remain unchanged, alleged discrimination against the British Columbia fruit grower is, it is pointed out, removed by the board disallowing the west-bound commodity rates in effect on July 6.

From the judgment of the majority, Commissioners McLean and Oliver dissent.

Commissioner Boyce finds in his judgment that the railway commission has jurisdiction under the railway act, over the tolls and tariffs of all railway companies within its jurisdiction and of its remedial functions and for the purpose of adjusting the present disparities and dislocation of rates may and should make such adjustments as will restore equalization and stabilization of railway rates throughout Canada. The board, he contends, while paying due regard to agreements, is in no conclusively bound by them.

**SETTELL MAINTAINS
CHARGES CORRECT**

Refuses To Withdraw Any
Statements Made in
Letter.

Hamilton, Oct. 14.—Not one of the definite charges contained in the letter sent by Clarence Settell to Sir Adam Beck, Chairman of the Ontario Hydro Commission, after Settell had attempted to abscond with \$29,925 belonging to the commission, were withdrawn by the prisoner this afternoon when Judge Colin G. Snider interviewed him at the jail. Judge Snider was recently named by the provincial government to prove the accusations contained in the lengthy typewritten document.

The conference was held for the purpose of getting further information to the charges laid by Settell. E. R. Clarkson, hydro auditor, will start an examination of hydro books in the morning to confirm or discredit what the prisoner said today.

"There was mention made of extravagance," Judge Snider said tonight. "In many cases in making complaints, Settell said that he 'believed this' and 'believed that,' but the belief is mostly in his own mind so far as could be learned."

"Regarding the definite charges he made, he took back nothing, nothing was withdrawn."

The statement of Judge Snider is regarded as important, as it was rumored that Settell was not prepared to substantiate the accusation. The firm stand of the prisoner makes certain now a complete investigation.

**MAN IS KILLED
BY KICK OF HORSE**

Percy Reitzel, St. Jacobs, Suc-
cumbs To Injuries On
Road.

Kitchener, Oct. 14.—When one of the horses he was driving kicked him in the chin, this afternoon, Percy Reitzel, aged 22, of St. Jacobs, had his neck broken and he expired on the road a few minutes later, 50 yards from where the accident occurred.

Reitzel, who was employed by Clarence Doerbecker of St. Jacobs, a village five miles from Waterloo, was drawing gravel from the pit of John Fries, a mile from St. Jacobs, when the tragedy occurred, but just how it happened no one knows, as he was alone at the time. He apparently walked 50 yards down the road after the accident searching for help, but then collapsed and when fellow farmers found him a few minutes later he was dead.

**ARTIFICIAL SUNLIGHT
USED TO CURE RICKETS**

Important Discoveries Are
Made by Maine Uni-
versity Professors.

Bangor, Oct. 14.—Artificial sunlight, provided by the fused quartz mercury vapor lamp, has the property of supplying the health-giving ultra violet rays which were found in experiments with baby chicks, just completed here in the laboratory of the University of Maine. The experiments are equally applicable to children and are valuable in preventing or curing

children's diseases, according to the experimenters.

"The importance of these experiments would be very great if they were applicable only to the raising of chickens," said Dr. W. T. Bovic, who conducted the experiments. "They are quite as applicable to the production of eggs, and more important still, they are applicable to raising of our own children for the disease known

as rickets can be cured by a proper exposure to the ultra violet light."

ous delay in field operations, and though in the majority of cases the men are receiving their board free, they prefer to return to their homes rather than wait for the resumption of threshing.

Complaints that farmers were charging harvesters for their board while waiting here, and while isolated cases were reported, it is not the general rule.
