RESIDENT OF AYLMER SUCCUMBS SUDDENLY

Prominent Citizen and Church-
man Passes in Seventy-
Seventh Year.

Aylmer, Oct. 12.—William R. Paterson, Sen., a well-known resident of Aylmer, died at his home here today in his 77th year, after an illness of about two years. He was born at

Guelph, and lived most of his life at Chesley, Ont., removing to Malahide some seven years ago, where he purchased a farm on Talbot street, just east of the town. With his family he moved to Aylmer last fall. The late Mr. Paterson was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Survivors are the widow, three sons, William, Harold and Walter, of Paterson Bros., hardware merchants, Aylmer; three daughters, Mrs. Ross Mayne, Springfield; Mrs. A. S. Tindale, Toronto; Miss Jessie Paterson, at home, three sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) Cook, Toronto; Mrs. J. Tange, Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. (Dr.) Fox of Vancouver, B.C.

The funeral will take place from his late residence on Wednesday, the 14th inst., at 2 o'clock p.m. Interment in the Aylmer cemetery.

HEALTH BOARD HAS SURPLUS FOR YEAR ASSERTS CHAIRMAN

Official Reports Show City Un-
expectedly Healthy For
Autumn Season.

RETURNS MATTRESSES

The board of health will not only be within its estimates this year, but will have a surplus, Chairman Charles Mitchell announced last night at a board meeting. Reports by the various board officials were received and were most satisfactory, showing the city to be quite healthy for this time of the year.

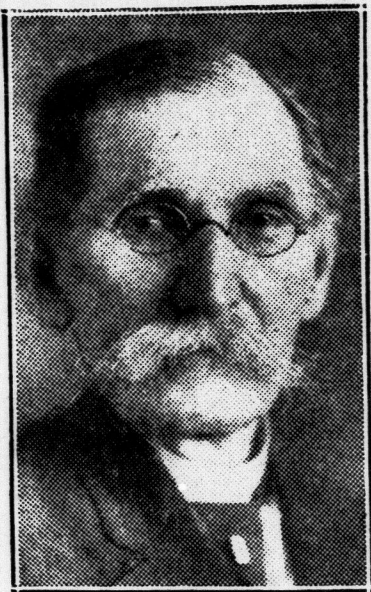
Sanitary Inspector R. H. Sanders stated that six bales of second-hand mattresses arriving in the city last week had been sent back to Montreal on his orders. He declared that the mattresses were not fit to have around, and that the man who was receiving them here had been making them over with equally filthy quilts as part filling and selling them.

"We don't want anything like that here," commented Chairman Mitchell, to which Ald. John Ashton agreed. Dr. W. S. Downham stated that he was in communication with the provincial authorities in the matter, and an effort will be made to stop the manufacture of this type of mattress in London.

Dr. Downham was appointed by the board to attend the American public health association meeting in St. Louis from Oct. 19 to 22.

Mr. Mitchell reported that a citizen had called him up, complaining about a powerful odor of sewer gas on the Wharncliffe road near Euclid avenue. Ald. Ashton stated that this was a matter for the city engineer's department, and the complaint will be passed on to him by the officials today.

The report of Dr. Downham, M. O. H., showed that there were 51 new cases of whooping cough reported during September and ten of diphtheria. There were but two cases of mumps and one of scarlet fever.

Success Greeted Concert of Women's Music Club

Miss Doris Doe, New York,
Captivates Large Audience at
Central Collegiate.

PLEASING OFFERINGS

The Central collegiate, gallery and pit, was filled last night for the opening concert of the Women's Music Club. The program offered was one which could not help but please. Doris Doe of New York has a contralto voice which is rich and lovely, while Alberto Guerrero, concert pianist, of Toronto, is capable of arousing the soul of his audience as he plays.

Miss Doe had the opening number, an aria from Coquard's Plainte d'Arlene, which displayed the technical beauties of her voice and the artistry with which she sings. But the numbers which gained for her the greatest applause were those which formed the second and last group.

Zur, Ruh, Zur, Ruh, by Hugo Wolf, sung in German, seemed especially adapted to her voice. Here the deep and lovely contralto notes found perfect expression. In marked contrast came the sweet lullaby of Geni Sadoro, in which the delicacy of her singing was shown. In beautiful cadences, the monotonous swing of the sleep song fell restfully and exquisitely upon the ears of her listeners. The tear in her voice gave expression to the longing of the mother for the father who might not come home.

The final number of this group, Lenz, from Hildach, demanded an encore, and the artist graciously sang Two Little Maples.

CLASSIC RESTRAINT IN PLAY AT GRAND

Bright Humor and Compelling
Pathos Mark A Fascinating
Devil.

Sweeping in action, bright in humor, and compelling in its flashes of pathos, A Fascinating Devil, which opened at the Grand, last night for a three-day run, makes a strong bid for the modern drama honors of the current season here.

From the pen of Myron C. Fagan, and directed by himself, the clever vehicle of society life, with its dominant note of bold hazard, is developed to a tingling degree of presentation by the cast which appears in this city.

Heavy duty honors in A Fascinating Devil are equally divided between Frederick Burt, who portrays the renowned New York specialist, and Helen Ware, the wealthy matron who falls before the wiles of the dashing, unscrupulous Jay Brighton (Bernard Nedell).

Helen Ware, a well-known tragedienne, fills the demands of a role that calls for a strenuous admixture of emotions, with a striking facility that stands out in every scene. Mr. Burt's playing, with its perfect affectations of the attitude and mannerisms of an exacting specialist in medicine, is equally as noteworthy.

Stable fascination and well-carried restraint in the more highly-colored stages of the poison plot are two of the attributes of Mr. Nedell, which make him a "fascinating devil" of the choicest sort.

For mirth, Dickie Willis and Bobbie Lorimer, taken by Bruce Evans and Faith Gage, combine in a manner which fits in well with the intermittent periods of suspense. Harry Redding gives a clever portrayal of the role of Kenneth Montague, fellow-conspirator of Brighton in his scheme for millions. Especially effective was his doubling for the type of the fast-living, dance-hall professional, who prolongs the fire of pleasure with sprinkles of cocaine.

Florence Mason, Wilbur Williams, and Albert Towell also carried their parts with a grace that added to the smoothness of the plot.

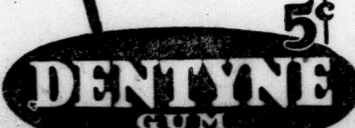
SUIT OVER LUXURY TAX HEARD IN COUNTY COURT

Frank McLachlin Suing Philip
Pocock For Tax On
Sedan.

Adjournment was made yesterday in the case of Frank McLachlin versus Philip Pocock. The plaintiff is suing for \$505 which represents the amount of luxury tax on a Packard sedan purchased by the defendant in 1922.

The agreement to purchase was made in April, 1922. Shortly after this the Fielding budget imposed a luxury tax on cars. The car was delivered in September. The plaintiff claims that it was understood that the defendant was to pay any tax imposed subsequent to the agreement.

All evidence was taken yesterday in the case. Counsel were ordered to cite their authorities in the judge's chambers at 10:30 o'clock this morning.

LESS HOLIDAY WORK FOR RURAL CARRIERS

Country Mailmen To Work As
Usual On Christmas
Day.

Commencing on Thanksgiving Day, rural mail deliveries throughout Canada are to be discontinued on holidays, with two exceptions, according to an advice received from Ottawa. The number of mail carriers that will be affected is 3,500. Of these, 800 are serving in this district. In future the rural carriers will

not make their rounds on New Year's Day, Good Friday, Dominion Day, Victoria Day, Labor Day and Thanksgiving Day.

Civic holidays have not been included as such holidays do not all fall on the same day. Owing to the holiday rush at Christmas, the carriers will be on duty.
