MOTHERS WOULD CENSOR THEATRES

Union Mothers' Club Members Visit Public Performances Privately.

The members of the Union Mothers' Club are ready to demand a public censorship of the theatrical performances which are being given in the London theatres. For three months past the executive of the club has been working quietly along this line, and not a performance has been given in the city at which there were not present representatives of the mothers' clubs, quietly acting as censors.

"The result of this quiet censorship of the theatres is not at all favorable to the type of performance which is being shown," says Mrs. W. A. Tanner, president of the Union Mothers' Club, who will bring the matter before a meeting of the Union Club next Monday night at 7:30 o'clock in the Lord Roberts School. "And we are determined to demand a censorship of the shows before they are presented in our city."

It is expected that the introduction of this subject will result in a very lively discussion and action on the part of the club members.

"We are no little body to be reckoned with," says Mrs. Tanner. "We have a membership of from thirteen to fourteen thousand London mothers and represent the feeling of a much larger body than that."

Dr. A. G. Grant of the London School Board will be the special speaker of the occasion, his subject being "The High School Question," and it is anticipated that his address will also be the means of producing discussion as to the possibility of erecting of collegiate institutes in the east and south ends of the city.

A request from L. D. McCamus, that the Union Club consent to the organization of a mothers' club in the new Trafalgar School, will also come before the meeting, which promises to be one of the most important of the year.

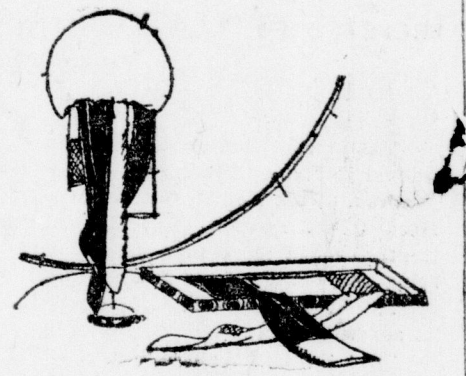
