N. company, has announced that a contract has been awarded to Swan & Hunter, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, for the construction of an 18 knot steamer of the dimensions already described. The steamer will have an iron hull, and a double bottom. It will have twin screws, and be modelled and finished on the most approved pattern, being specially designed for the ferry service between Victoria and Vancouver.
