Victoria has a worse mail service with Seattle during the summer when two boats are on the run than during the winter when only one boat is on the run. The reason for that is that the prize Canadian idiot the post office de-

partment, has a contract with a line of steamships to carry the mail to Victoria, in which a particular steamboat is designated as the mail carrier.
