(From Wednesday's Daily.) Interviewing Government.—A delegation from the lower mainland, consisting of Robt. S. Kittson, reeve of Ladmer; N. A. McDiarmid, clerk of the municipality; and Messrs. Chris. Brown, of Surrey, and Daniel Johnson, of Elgin is here to interview the government in regard to a number of necessary improvements to the district. They are making their headquarters at the Dominion.

Floods in Interior.—Alarming flood conditions prevail in the Kootenay country and the interior exchanges just to hand are full of reports of mishaps. The Red Mountain railway, running between iRossland and Northport, is blocked by snowslides, and a similar condition prevails on other lines. The cause has been a very heavy fall of snow without any chinooks late in the winter. The rise of the Fraser river has not been extraordinary.

Yukon's Output.—A special despatch from Dawson to the Seattle Post-Intelligencer says: "The harvest of millions in gold in the Klondike, Nome, Tanana, Koyukuk, Rampart, Atlin, Big Salmon, Alsek and other northern fields is on for the same of the Alsek and other northern fields is on for the season of 1904. The Klondike alone will produce at least ten millions this season. Nome has done more work this winter than ever before and will swell the total several millions more. Rampart and Tanana have eclipsed anything they have ever done. The first stucing of the year in the Klondike began today. Water is running freely on most of the creeks. The clean-up will be in full blast in about three weeks. Mahy hig hydraulic and dredging plants will work this year.

A Monster Mail.—The ousiest body of men in the city of Victoria last night was the staff at the local post office, for the Charmer on her trip from Vancouver brought over no less than 200 sacks of delayed mail, representing the accumulation of seven days at the point in the mountains where the C. P. H. service was put out of business by the immense snowslides.
