Dear Sir—I have the honor by direction of the Trades and Labor Council to forward to you the enclosed newspaper clipping and the following resolution which was unanimously passed at a regular meeting on the 15th instant, viz.:

"That this council ask the Dominion government to take steps to prevent the reported inrush of Hindoo laborers into this country, and that a copy of this resolution, together with press reports on the Hindoos, be sent to the Hon, the Prime Minister, the Hon, the Minister of Labor, and the member for Viotoria electoral district."


