THE REDISTRIBUTION BILL
A SWEEPING CHANGE IN THE RIDINGS OF ONTARIO.
Fifty-two Ridings Changed—Charges of Gerrymandering—Sir John's Defence
OTTAWA, April 25.—Sir John Macdonald introduced his long expected bill for the redistribution of the representation to-day, and it proved so sweeping in its scope as almost to take the opposition's breath away. Quebec and the maritime provinces were virtually untouched, the whole force of the gerrymandering falling on Ontario, in which no less than fifty-two constituencies are manipulated almost wholly in the interest of the government.
The GENERAL RESULT of the changes is to give Ontario four more seats and Manitoba one more. The consistency of Niagara is merged into Lincoln and Bertha's constituency of Cornwall into Stomont. Simcoe will have two members instead of three; Lambton two instead of one; Bruce three instead of two; Middlesex four instead of three; Essex two instead of one; and Ontario three instead of two. Toronto is left as before. East York is to consist of the townships of East York, Scarborough, and Markham, and the villages of Markham and Yorkville. North York is to consist of the townships of King, East Gwillibrue, West Gwillibrue, North Gwillibrue and Georgina, and the villages of Holland Landing, Bradford and Aurora.

THE END OF LAMSON.

LONDON, April 18.—The execution took place in the great old Pantheon, there were only three reporters present.
