

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto enacts as follows: Ward Number Two.

MOULTON-STREET.

a, that the name of the street is known as Gordon-avenue, extend Dale-avenue to Elm-avenue in Ward No. 2, is kereby changed to hereafter be known and designated ton-crescent, the said street being a tion of Nanton-crescent.

1. That the name of the street heretofore known as Anderson-lane, being the first street north of Queen-street and extending from Simcoe-street to William-street in Ward No. 4, is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as Pullanplace, there being another street in the said municipality named Anderson-street.

2. That the name of the street heretofore known as Bear-street, extending northerly fromSt. Patrick-street, between Hickory-street and Carlisle-street in Ward No. 4, is hereby changed to and shall herealter be known and designated as Casimir-street, the property-owners on the said street having requested this change.

That the name of the street heretofore known as Saurin-street, extending from Lisgar-street to Northcote-avenue and situated between Argyle-street and McKenzie-crescent in Ward No. 5, is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as Afton-avenue, there being another street in the said municipality named Sorauren-avenue, and a largely signed petition from the property owners on the said street having been received asking for this change. This bylaw and all the changes therein provided are subject to the approval of the Judge of the County Court of the County of York, and the same shall not take effect until approved of by such judge after due notice as provided in the Municipal Act.
