DOUBLE SUICIDE BY SHOOTING

Washington Politicians.
Washington, Aug. 21.—Two members of the Cabinet yesterday expressed the opinion that the President will allow the Tariff bill to become law without his signature. Both admitted that this opinion was based upon statements made by Mr. Cleveland before leaving Washington, and not upon any information from Gray Gables. So far as can be learned the President has not written to any of his Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 21.—Japanese arriving from the Orient by the latest steamers have communicated to their own countrymen here a declaration of an intention on the part of the home Government eventually to compel China to surrender the Province of Manchuria to them. This would cut off the Corean peninsula from the Chinese Empire, and restore to Japan territory which was originally possessed by it, and which is larger in area than all of Corea.
