other, and so unprotected in themselves, the original design of settling the country seems to have been completely set aside, and, instead of strengthening the barrier to their valuable possessions in New Spain, they have thrown irressible temptations in the way of strangers to trespass over their boundary.

From their dominions in New Spain they have · flocked this frontier country with fuch an abundance of cattle of all descriptions, that it is no longer in their power, even were they fo inclined; to effect their extermination. They have also ; pointed out many fertile spots, some of which are very extensive, where they have introduced the most valuable vegetable productions, not only neceffary to the sustenance, but ministering to many of the luxuries, of civilized fociety; and they have, by their previous experiments, fully afcertained in what degree each is found to fucceed. A certain proportion of the natives have, by the indefatigable labour of the missionaries, been weaned from their former uncivilized, favage way of life, and are become obedient to focial forms, and practifed in many domestic occupations. All these circumstances are valuable confiderations to new mafters, from whose power, if properly employed, the Spaniards would have no alternative but that of submissively yielding.

That fuch an event should take place appears
