#### THE SPRINGHILL DISASTER

THE terrible explosion at the Spring hill coal mines in Nova Scotia, on the 22nd inst, by which 119 hves were lost is an awful illustration of the risks and dangers run by the laboring clasin the routine of daily duty. The fact that the mine was carefully inspected a few days before the accident, by a government inspector, and also by a committee of workmen who corrobo rated his report that everything wa in good order and perfectly safe, while exonerating any individual from blame, indicates something very defective in the present methods of inspection. If our rulers took as much care of work ingmen's lives as they do of property interests, such calamities would b much rarer than they unfortunately are. The disaster, by robbing many families of their bread winners, has plunged a number of homes in poverty, and public subscriptions are being called for in aid of the sufferers. In any well ordered society those dependent upon men who fell victims to such a catastrophe would not be left to depend
