in which distinguished merit in our profession is now held. We cannot, therefore, but think that a more graceful act. could not possibly be performed by His Excellency the Governor General, than the recommendation to Her Majesty to bestow the dignity of Knighthood upon someprominent member of the profession in Canada. He who has been mentioned by our correspondent is the one aboveall whom we believe every medical man in the Dominion would rejoice to see the first to be thus honored. Dr. Campbell has labored in this country for nearly forty years, during which time he has acquired for himself, as a surgeon, and as a teacher of the Art, an extended American and even European fame. The benefits conferred upon the country by the labors of such a man, to whom every town and country-side in Canada is indebted through the ability and skill of his many pupils, are simply inestimable. In thus honoring Dr. Campbell, honor would beconferred upon the profession of which he is a distinguished ornament, upon McGill University (the pioneer university of Canada), of which he is one of the main supporting pillars, upon Montreal, which has long been proud of his great reputation, and lastly upon the Dominion of Canada, where his name is a household word.

MEDICAL PUBLICITY.
