

Leave to senator or official to appear before Commons

104. (1) When the House of Commons requests that a senator or any of the officers, clerks, or servants of the Senate attend before the House of Commons to be examined or appear before any committee thereof, such request shall be by message from the House of Commons requesting that the Senate grant leave to such senator, officer, clerk or servant to attend.

(2) If the Senate grants leave, an officer, clerk or servant of the Senate shall attend before the House of Commons or a committee thereof, and a senator may attend if he thinks fit.

Penalty

(3) Without such leave, a senator, officer, clerk or servant of the Senate shall not, on any account, under penalty of being committed to the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod or to prison during the pleasure of the Senate, go down to the House of Commons, or send his answer in writing, or appear by counsel to answer any accusation there.

Searching of Journals

105. The Journals of the Senate may be searched by the House of Commons, as the Journals of that House may be searched by the Senate.

Seats for Commons

106. Seats shall be reserved without the Bar of the Senate chamber for members of the House of Commons who may desire to hear the debates.

Minutes transmitted to Governor General

107. A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings, certified by the Clerk, shall be transmitted daily to the Governor General.

Journals bound

108. The Journals shall be bound in annual volumes with full indexes as soon as may be after each session.

Printing

109. The printing or publishing of anything relating to the proceedings of the Senate shall be as ordered by the Senate.

Papers ordered

110. Accounts and papers may be ordered to be laid on the table, and the Clerk shall communicate to the Government Leader in the Senate all orders for papers made by the Senate and such papers when returned shall be laid on the table.

Addresses for papers involving prerogative

111. When the royal prerogative is concerned in any account or paper, an address shall be presented to the Governor General praying that the same may be laid before the Senate.
