My dear Sir Arthur,

I have just received a private and unofficial enquiry (between ourselves, it came from Mrs. Adami) as to whether McGill will act on my proposal to bring Adami out here for a week or so.

It appears that he could come in his Easter vacation but that there has been such a lot of discussion since the announcement of the Liverpool treatment last November that already the whole of Adami's long vacation bids fair to be taken up with medical conferences.

As you know, I am most anxious to see Adami come here. My suggestion would be that we pay the expenses of himself and his wife for their coming and their going and their stay here and that we give him an honarium of a thousand dollars. It is little enough but I suppose we cannot afford more. The two Adamis were so endlessly kind while I was in England that I should not like to cause them any inconvenience or delay and would like it very much if I could either cable to Adami that McGill was sending him an invitation or else cable to him my intense regret that the scheme had not proved feasible.

I have written Chipman about this and if matter I will gladly do it.
