

> The blossoms of the plant are so teautiful, altho so large that a closer study will well repay the casual passerby. From two to four inches passerby. From two to four inches across, they are borne in loose terminal clusters of from 10 to 12 or 15, on the rather thick light-green blossom stem, standing all of ten inches above the

rest of the plant.

Long ago our Indians described this golden blossom as the "Flower that blossoms in the cool swamps," calling it "Onondaga." It has been claimed for many hundred years that this same plant is the "kingcup" immortalized by English poets both modern and ancient. The delightful thing about the plant is that it can be brought in from the swamps with almost no trouble and transferred to your own water garden with ease. Given a quiet spot with plenty of still water, some slushy soil in which to grow its sprawly roots, and a ray or two of sun occasionally, and marsh marigold asks no better fate, whether diving in the still recesses of a shady copse or in a manufactured lily pool, tho it be made out of an ordinary everyday wooden tub. No water garden can pretend to be a water garden without a clump of wild marsh marigolds, so hie you out to the swamps some day soon and commence your lily pool by bringing to it a healthy cluster of these homely aquatics.
