

Hockey Montreal Teams Win Two Openers

Baseball Peace Agreement Said to Be Signed

FLYING FRENCHMEN DO UP THE TORONTO SIX

Winning Opening Hockey Game in Arena by a Score of Two to One.

Professional hockey for the 1915-1916 season was ushered in Saturday night when the Canadiens and Toronto played the first N.H.A. game at Arena Gardens. The visiting Frenchmen came off the ice with two tallies in their favor, which they got in the last period, while the local players were only credited with one goal, and that they registered in the first period.

There was a good crowd on hand for an opening match. The playing was rather loose during the contest. Producers, the new man on the Canadiens line-up, put up some great speed, and was responsible for both of the goals, and both were made by long seven minutes. Percy Lesieur, the redoubtable in the nets, was Toronto's savior, for Pitar and Newey Lalonde, both of them, could not squeeze them thru.

Both teams were inclined to rough it up, and the officials handed out 21 minor and 8 major penalties, minor infractions going to Toronto and twelve to the Canadiens. Each team got four fouls in very free play, Canadiens having the advantage in weight pressed Toronto very sorely all thru the contest.

Manager Kennedy did not get a chance to work his proposed new scheme of playing a different team in the second period, as Toronto gave them some score sent in for Toronto by Corbett. Denny ten minutes after play, together with the number of men chased off the ice, was largely responsible.

The Denny brothers started a fine speedy game, and Corbett Denny at the centre played a very effective game, going good as soon as he appeared on the ice, but as for the rest of the play, it is a little early to tell what the real deal will be.

During the first period the game was always dangerous in the visitors' camp, as the Toronto forward line managed to keep the puck in that quarter very largely. After a goal was shot by Corbett Denny the local boys yelled for the Frenchmen off their feet, and it is only due to the creditable showing of Vesina that no more scoring was done this period.

At the beginning of the middle period Toronto came out bubbling over with encouragement, so the Frenchmen started to rough it up some. Pitar hit Lesieur, and he drew the first major penalty. Canadiens began to find some on the sides continually, and at one time the mixup was so bad that seven Canadiens got on the ice at once and could not play until the spectators yelled for six men.

Newey Lalonde got going good in this period and showed that he still had some of the old time pep and speed. Producers was put off twice during the period, and seemed to delight in handling out the rough kind of play. Neither team were able to score during this period, but the rough mudders can be decorated with the medals for this.

During the last session both teams were striking a slower pace and nearly every square yard was still being pressed into service. Lesieur, the Ottawa, and Lalonde, the Canadiens, were the only ones to get a good run, the entire length of the ice, shooting dead on the Canadiens' net, but Vesina's eagle eye was there, and the chance went to the boards. A few minutes after the whistle blew Producers, in a flashing break, all the way down the rink, passed every man on the Canadiens, and one minute after that Lesieur, and one minute after that Vesina, the same done, giving Canadiens one goal better than their opponents.

After this Toronto could not get into their former stride and began to play rather loosely and individually were unable to carry anything effective. Three minutes before the going rang the Canadiens, having three of their regulars off for penalties, and the spaces, who were not on the ice, looking up the trunk, were forced to play with five men, and the Canadiens ruled one of the Toronto men off to even up, and the spectators made a wild cheer about this. At the close of play Toronto had very man up forward and Canadiens began to hug their goal.

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THE BALTIMORE PROBLEM HITCH IN BASEBALL PACT

However, Ban Johnson Says It is Sure to Come—Feds Out for Good.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—According to a statement made today by a man financially interested in the negotiations, representatives of the Federal, National and American Leagues signed a peace agreement at the New York meeting, ensuring the withdrawal from the field of the Federal League, without the assumption of the Baltimore Federal League team, in the matter, as Gravenhurst is dissatisfied with the manner in which the group was divided at the schedule meeting.

According to the authority quoted at the meeting, the minor leagues retain their players until the opening of the Baltimore Federal League season, by contract and reimbursing its backers from the sale of players to clubs in organized baseball.
