# SHERIFF MOTZ OF BERLIN

Was One of Pioneers of German-Canadian Journalism-Prominent in Municipal Affairs.

BERLIN, Ont., Oct. 29.—(Special.)— One of Berlin's oldest residents passed away at an ear.y nour this morning in the person of Sherin John Motz, at the ad-not dags of Si years.
The late sheriff was born in Diedorf,

Prassia, on June 5, 1860. His mother dies when he was ten years of age and his father when he was 16. In 1848 he dec.ded to come to Canada, where his i.ter, neg.na, was nving with her us.and, r. He returned to Berlin and became a student at the grammar school, with the intention of going into teaching, but instead he and Frederick Rittinger they tried to buy out The Deutsche Canadier, and so, in December, 1859, te/ estab shed The Berliner Journal, and the partnership continued until the death of Frederick Rittinger, in Octo-

In January, 1899, John Motz retired from business, and the business is still co ti ned by the s.ms of the founders, Jon A. Rittinger and William John

The late Mr. Motz took an active part in muricipal affairs, as councilior, detry re ve and mayor. a so as member of the separate and st school and free library tads He a so identified himsef wih the local and county children's ad societies. 





