National Commission Says Giants and Athletics 'Knew Nothing About the Scalping.

CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 5 .- The final lid was clamped and sealed here to-day on he celebrated ticket-scaping scandal, that ruffled the baseball horizon directly following the world's championship series New York and Philadelphia last October. While the National Baseball Commission gathered enough evidence to as sure it that wholesale ticket-scalping took place in both towns, yet this evidence indicated that neither the New York National nor the Philadelphia Amerfork National nor the Philadelphia American League owners, managers, players or employes were in collusion with the scalpers. The commission holds that the tharges of the press at the time were hustified, but gently scores a number of beople who at thetime of the episode offered to produce proof as to the alleged collusion, but failed to deliver any evidence of value.

In addition to exonerating both clubs, the commission praises them for the extra precautions that were taken against scalpers. State and municipal legislation against scalping is urged.
