Percupine Lake Company Will Prove Up Lake Bottom-Means Much For Camp.

PORCUPINE, March 18.—(From Our Man Up North.)—The north end of the Porcupine Lake bottom, on the Porcupine Lake Gold Mines Co.'s property is to be diamond drilled to depth. There is anxiety on the part of the officials of the company to learn what lies underneath the lake bottom, and the diamond drill now in use on the Standard Mines property will be transferred to the Porcupine Lake lot this week.
