LOAN IS NEEDED NOW TO MAKE CANADA SAFE

Objective in Sight, But Every Effort Required to Make It Big Success.

"While we can never be absolutely certain until the returns are actually recorded, I am confident we are within sight of our \$500,000,000 objective," said E. R. Wood, chairman of the Dominion executive, Victory Loan.

"Evidently the public appreciates at its true value the new situation created by the cessation of hostilities. That situation is a serious one—not one to cause alarm—but serious. Our boys at the front have finished their task as far as actual fighting is concerned. But our war task at home will not be completed until we have restored the country to normal conditions."

"We can make of this transition period on which we are now entering what we will. If we let things slide it will be dangerous; if we grasp the situation firmly we can transform it into one of magnificent opportunity. There are tremendous possibilities for Canadian industry and production—if we finance them."

"Some one might unthinkingly suggest that the Victory Loan is no longer needed to back up the men at the front. That would be a shortsighted suggestion. Between now and Saturday night Canada has another world to demonstrate to the world. A great over-subscription to the loan will be an inspiration to our own people and a notice to the world that Canada is a force to be reckoned with in the days ahead. My message is, therefore, to everybody, to keep on buying every bond you can until the loan is closed."

HACKNEY DAY AT NEW YORK SHOW

Judge Moore is Big Winner on Second Day at New York.

New York, Nov. 13.—This was "Hackney Day" at the Horse Show. Ten of twenty-four classes decided were limited to English hackneys, and there was particular interest in the young stock bred on American farms. Country gentlemen and professional breeders were conspicuous along the ring rails. Roger Van derhey, president of the American Hackney Horse Society, sat in the judges' box during the morning, when five classes were judged in succession. Four classes were up for competition for the gold medals offered by the Canadian Hackney Horse Society.

That interest in the hackney is keen was shown by the increased attendance today. While the morning sessions rarely are attended by any except farmers and breeders, the crowd this morning was twice as large as on other days. One of the features of the morning session was the class for the best three, the get of one sire. First prize was captured by Judge Moore, who showed three beautiful specimens of breed, that could not be excelled in color, type, quality and action by the get of any other hackney stallion in the world.

After this event was judged, a well-known British breeder of hackneys remarked that it was an unfortunate thing that such a distinguished breeder as Judge Moore should be so conservative as to refuse to allow his great stallion, Marlborough, to be put to the public service at a fee, also that other breeders could use him to perpetuate the blood of Great Britain, where the breeding of hackneys is almost a religion. It is entirely unusual for a breeder to reserve a stallion for his own use. Judge Moore has received many requests for the use of his great stallion, and there is little doubt that eventually he will change his attitude and allow Marlborough to be used for the general betterment of the breed in America.

The class for hackney mares saw the passing of an old favorite, when Miss Constance Vancleave's The Whip was relegated to fourth place. It was the general opinion among the shrewd that The Whip was beginning to show her age. She is one the best mares ever seen in the Garden, but she lost out because of lack of condition.

The hope was expressed that this great mare be retired to the stud before advancing age spoils her chances to perpetuate her remarkable qualities. The awards were as follows:

HUMBER RIVER APPLIANCES

DISGRACE, SAY JURYMEN

That the life-saving appliances on the Humber River are a disgrace to the County of York, was a rider added by the coroner's jury in returning a verdict last night on the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. Mehanic Youngblaut of the Royal Air Force, who was drowned in the Humber River on Oct. 29. The jury found that death was accidental, but that Youngblaut had taken a canoe out, had capsized and had overturned and sunk before help could reach him. Major C. J. Currie conducted the inquest.

TO SUPREME COURT.

Case of Will of Late D. T. Burk of Port Hope.

The case of the will of the late D. T. Burk of Port Hope will be removed from the court at Thunder Bay to the supreme court of Ontario. In this case the application of the second wife for a probate of the will is being opposed by Katherine Clarkson, a daughter by the first wife. The testator is alleged to have divorced his first wife and remarried within a year, contrary to the divorce laws of the United States.

SOLDIERS NOT REPRESENTED.

The Parkdale G.W.V.A. have wired Ottawa protesting because no soldier representative has been appointed to accompany Premier Borden to Europe to take part in the after-war deliberations. Labor and other interests have had representatives chosen, but the soldiers have been overlooked. The Ottawa executive is asked to take the matter up.
