While expressing his disappointment that Saltfleet had not carried the bylaw, Rev. J. A. Stewart pointed out that below the mountain, where a great many of the large property holders reside, a majority had been given for radicals, but the majority vote was given by the mountain-top residents, who claimed that they would receive no benefits from the radicals.

BYLAW IS DEFEATED BY SALT FLEET VOTERS

Hamilton, March 16.—Hydro radicals carried in Nelson township by a majority of 46 on Saturday, but were defeated in Saltfleet township by 41 votes. In Nelson township the vote was for and 85 against, while in Saltfleet the bylaw got 46 votes and the opposition 39.

The World was informed, however, from an authoritative source, that the turning down of the bylaw in Saltfleet would not hinder the Hydro Commission from proceeding with the immediate construction of the radials.

Residents of the Beach, who for the time suffered from the high-handed actions of the Dominion Power and Transmission Company, turned in a majority of 46 for the bylaw, while the residents on a mountain top were responsible for the bylaw being defeated in Saltfleet.

UNIONIST GOVERNMENT READY TO VOTE SUPPLY

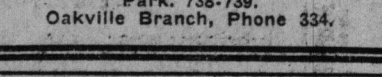

Manitoba Grain Growers Urge Lowering of the Tariff.

Winnipeg, March 16.—At a meeting of the executive of the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association here on Friday afternoon last, the following resolution, with regard to fiscal and tariff issues in the Dominion at the present time, was unanimously adopted, and the secretary directed to send copies to the Manitoba members of the house of commons.

"Whereas the historic policy of the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association has been that of a general lowering of the customs tariff, looking to our ultimate free trade with Great Britain and reduction in duties on goods imported from other countries, with special emphasis on free importation of all implements used in agriculture and other industries, believing, as we do, that such a policy would be to the best interest of our particular class, but of all the people:

"And whereas, during the time that Canada has been at war not only has there been no progress in the direction of giving effect to this policy, but on the other hand, an actual increase in duty on the whole circle of imports, including many articles absolutely essential both in the industries and in the common life of our people; and whereas, since the agriculture is the base industry of the Dominion, Canada can be best maintained by encouraging the greatest possible increased production of the fields.
