

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS BRACONDALE ANNEXATION

Vote at Ratepayers' Meeting Shows Strong Sentiment—City Willing to Embrace District.

A meeting to discuss annexation—second one—was at Hillcrest School, Wyckwood, last night, and was largely attended. Chairman Ross called on J. Henderson to report the result of the interview with the city board of control. He said that the proposal was that if Bracondale wished to join with Toronto it would have to enter unconditionally. The controllers looked favorably on annexation, and if the district wished, would accept.

Some speakers thought that the district should receive the same consideration as North Rosedale did. The chairman said the controllers wanted to know if the ratepayers were prepared to pay 12 or 13 mill rate. Mr. Joy said the ratepayers had all to gain and nothing to lose. He knew of property being higher assessed in the township than in the city.
