The mine managers handed out the following statement: "At a meeting of the representatives of the underground industry was adopted unanimously: 'That this body of mine managers and superintendents, firmly believing in the schedule of wages offered to the employees of the Cobalt mines is eminently just and fair, and is higher than any other scale at present in force in Ontario, unanimously adhere to the agreement and scale of wages and hours published by themselves...'
