**THAT "NASTY CROSSING" A DETRIMENT TO THE CITY**  
A Rochester, N. Y., Gentleman Writes to Say That It Keeps People From Visiting Us.

A business man was asked yesterday by a visitor to the exhibition offices, why he was willing to pay a considerable sum of money for transportation to exhibit his articles at the Toronto Exhibition. He said that he found it was the best possible means of pushing his wares. As a sample, he quoted an instance where a man had said that he always came to Toronto to place his orders at fair-time, because he had an opportunity then to pick and choose. This man gave this particular exhibitor an order off-hand for two car-loads of stoves, and, being in the general hardware line, he said that he had the same day ordered no less a quantity than \$500 worth of goods. In fact, he came to Toronto at least and usually did his buying for the year.

**CHINAMEN PUT SAVINGS IN SAFE CANADIAN BANKS**  
Italians Who Trust Money to Compatriots Might Learn Wisdom From Celestials.

A banking man, who until lately has been directly in touch with the Italian colony, discussing the Gianetti affair, stated to The World that Italians were prone to trust their funds to dishonest and individuals who were disreputable. "The scheme they work is this," he said. "They take the money to send to Italy. This takes six weeks. The man comes in at the expiration of that time, and is told that something is wrong. This takes another two weeks. In the meantime the money is being used in private speculation right here in Toronto."

The man also hinted that there was another agency at present operating in Italian quarters on the same scheme, and that sooner or later this firm would come to grief. In marked contrast to the confidence of the members of the Italian colony place in private banks of their own people, it is pointed out that the Chinamen have big deposits, and a "yellow man" from the orient is hard in the country to leave before the day they will be the guests of the directors. **HOTELS OVERCROWDED**  
**GUESTS GO ACROSS LAKE**  
No Place Else Where They Can Lay Their Heads—Exhibition Will Cap Climax.

All the leading hotels are crowded with visitors and the managers are engaging private apartments in various parts of the city to accommodate late arrivals. The conventions of the insurance underwriters and boat and shoe workers and the O. R. A. matches help to swell the throng. At the King Edward "doubling up" and the use of cots has been resorted to, but even this is not sufficient to meet the demands and people have to be refused every night.

A similar state of things prevails at the Rossin, Walker and Paemer houses, and the Iroquois, Imperial and Arlington, Grand Union and other hotels. At the Queen's many of the guests are making a daily trip across the lake, spending the day in the city and the evenings at the Queen's royal Niagara-on-the-Lake. The bookings for the exhibition weeks are far in advance of last year, and it appears certain that every available room near the centre of the city will be "commandeered" by the hotel people, to provide for their guests.

The committee of the British Wicketeers League have been approached by two or three of the hotel managers to see whether it will be possible to utilize the hotel for sleeping visitors, subject to the requirements of the new arrivals.

**TALLY-HO OWNERS' WAR ENDS IN POLICE COURT**  
Horse vs. Electricity Behind Prosecution for Obstruction of a Thoroughfare.

Three of Patrick Maher's men were up in police court yesterday, one of them for driving without a license, and the other two for obstructing Victoria-street with tally-hos.

William Newey, the man charged with driving without a license, explained that one of the drivers was absent on the day in question and that he had been sent out just for one trip. Magistrate Kingsford, however, fined him \$1 and costs, and said he thought the driver should be fined for not having a license. Mr. Maher and J. Robertson had been notified by a policeman to get them out of the way, and the constable in his evidence said that one of the teams was blocking the side entrance to W. A. Murray's store. He said he had been called over by Robert J. Lee, an employee at the Murray store, and asked to have the way cleared.

Robert J. Lee said that he had frequently noticed the tally-ho on the west side of Victoria-street, but on the day in question did not see any teams drive up to the side entrance of the store, with which the tally-ho would have interfered. There was still quit a space left in the middle of the road for traffic.

E. C. Hill of the Electric Tally-ho Co. admitted being the indirect complainant in the case, and said that he had made complaints to the police. His reason for complaining was that the electric tally-hos could not draw up to call for passengers when Mr. Maher's teams were being driven along the side of the road as long as a half or three-quarters of an hour at a time, but never took the King Edward more than ten minutes.

J. W. Curry, K.C., representing Mr. Maher, endeavored to have the witness say that he had cornered the tally-ho, because he thought that Mr. Maher's teams were getting too much of the trade, but Mr. Hill did not look at it that light.

Magistrate Kingsford fined Mr. Maher \$1 and costs, and adjourned the case against Robertson till call.

Mr. Curry was, however, granted an enlargement of ten days and will appear at the next sitting.
